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John Woodward and Shaun Thomas have been clear since promotion that Coventry Sphinx aren't in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands to make up the numbers.

We saw that in the first three matches. Games against Quorn, Gresley Rovers and Sporting Khalsa each presented a different challenge that Sphinx stared down.

Two points from three matches might not be the start of the season we wanted but it's important to take the positives. There were a few in game one. There were some in game two.

In game three, against Khalsa here six days ago, there were loads. Sphinx lost the game but at the time of writing Khalsa are top of the table. They could very easily have not been.

Khalsa are a known quantity for us. Our meetings at Step Five were always feisty and fiery affairs and, frankly, generally pretty difficult to stomach from a Sphinx point of view.

They finished fourth in the NPL Midlands last season so we know they've improved in the intervening years. They've added well to the strong core that usually had our number.

But last week was, for my money, the best Sphinx display I've seen against Khalsa including the odd occasion on which we've picked up a point or a win against them.

We took the game to them right from kick-off and, while they took their chance and we didn't, I think anyone not of the baffling opinion that Khalsa were hard done by will agree we were equal at worst. So, despite being winless (again, at the time of writing), I'd argue we're progressing match after match.

In a new division, at a whole new level even, that's the biggest positive of all. I'm proud of and impressed with the way the team have stepped up so far.

You have an advantage over me in the sense that you know the outcome of Saturday's match against Spalding United, another team established at Step Four and building on a great start.

What happens/happened there will throw its light on today's match. The only thing I'm sure of is that the boys will give maximum effort in Lincolnshire because they always do.

Today we welcome the supporters, players, management and officials of Bedworth United to the Sphinx Industrial Supplies Arena for what I'm sure will be a spectacular Bank Holiday clash.

We know each other well. Sphinx and Bedworth have met often in recent years including a couple of tight cup ties. Last year we played in the Emirates FA Cup, a 1-0 win here for the Greenbacks.

Pre-season friendlies had become annual events before Sphinx's promotion so I think it's fair to say we enjoy a friendly rivalry with a team full of familiar faces. Today might feel a little different.

This is the second game of a fascinating weekend. We'll learn a lot this Bank Holiday. The step up has been evident but we've handled it admirably up to this point.

Now, that forward progress has to continue and be translated into more points and, crucially, a win. We've been competitive in every match, superior for significant periods, and that's a great platform as we seek now to push on to bigger and better things. Let's start today.

The history of Coventry Sphinx began in 1946. Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft FC had been highly successful in the city before and during the Second World War and changed their name to Sphinx FC.

AWA's legacy was replicated by the new club. Sphinx won a number of league and cup competitions throughout the 1950s and 1960s before playing a major role in the formation of the Coventry Alliance and continuing to win trophies in the following decades.

Coventry underwent significant socioeconomic change in the 1990s. The recession led to the closure of factories in the city and surrounding areas, which in turn led to the dissolution of many of Coventry's football clubs. Sphinx needed a new challenge and joined the Midland Combination Football League in 1993.

In our first season in the Midland Combination we were promoted from Division 2 and reached the semi-finals of the Birmingham Sunday Vase. A second consecutive promotion followed thanks to a second-placed finish in Division 1 the next season.

With promotion to the top division of the Midland Combination secured it was decided that the club should be linked more closely to our city. We became Coventry Sphinx and the first match under our new name was against a Coventry City XI at our home ground.

Throughout its history, our club has been served by countless loyal and hard-working local people who've contributed enormously to Coventry Sphinx on and off the field. Through their dedication we

have achieved some unbeatable highs. There have also been times of great tragedy.

In November 2001, Sphinx manager Willie Knibbs was killed in a car accident on the way home from a cup match at Meir KA. Willie was a former Sphinx player in his second spell as manager. His death was a terrible loss to our club and to local football in Coventry.

After a painful season, Sphinx went on to win the Midland Combination Challenge Cup and it was renamed the Willie Knibbs Cup as a mark of respect. Our main stand is also named in Willie's honour.

Sphinx became one of the leading teams in the Midland Combination Premier League, finishing as runners-up in our first season and again in both 2005 and 2006. We reached the final of the Endsleigh Challenge Cup on three occasions, losing to Alveston at Villa Park in 1999 but beating Coventry Marconi in 2003 and Feckenham in 2005.

We also won the Coventry Evening Telegraph Cup in successive seasons, making Sphinx the last winners of the competition at Highfield Road and the first at the Ricoh Arena.

Although first team success is a driving force, the heartbeat of our club is the thriving junior section. Formed in 1997, it started with just three teams and has grown ever since. There are now hundreds of players representing Coventry Sphinx and we were the first club in Coventry to achieve the FA Charter.

Our youth team started competing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League in 2003 and one of the

biggest successes to date came in the 2014/15 season, when they won the double after suffering only one league defeat and beating Stourbridge 3-0 in the Birmingham County FA Midweek Floodlit Youth Cup.

Under manager Paul Charnley, Coventry Sphinx's men's first team completed a remarkable treble achievement in May 2007.

In addition to finally becoming champions of the Midland Football Combination – achieving promotion to the Midland Football Alliance in the process – Sphinx won the Coventry Charity Cup and the BCFA Midland Floodlit Cup.

The 2007/08 season saw Sphinx enjoy our best ever run in the FA Vase, reaching the quarter-final for the very first time and losing controversially to Kirkham & Wesham, the eventual Wembley winners, in a replay at Sphinx Drive.

We made a run to the semi-finals of the League Cup in the same season and went on to win the Midland Alliance Polymac League Cup by beating Westfields in the final in 2009/10.

In 2014/15 the club was honoured to become a founder member of the Midland Football League Premier Division. After a top ten finish under Stuart Dutton, Lee Knibbs took over as manager in the autumn of 2017.

Lee is the son of Willie Knibbs and returned to the club after an earlier spell as assistant manager to Danny McSheffrey.

He guided Sphinx to some of our most memorable results of the decade before deciding to step aside in November 2019.

Knibbs was succeeded by his assistants, John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, who became the club's joint managers and ended the truncated 2019/20 season on a long unbeaten run, the foundation of Sphinx's greatest achievement to come.

Sphinx made a sideways move as part of FA restructuring ahead of the 2021/22 season, competing in a newly formed Premier Division South in the United Counties League.

In our first season we finished in fourth place, losing only twice in the second half of the season, and enjoyed a long run in the FA Vase, narrowly missing out on another quarter-final.

The following season saw Sphinx lose on penalties again in the same round of the FA Vase but 2022/23 was the best season in our history.

In the space of one week in April, our club acquired the freehold to the Sphinx Drive ground for the very first time and secured the United Counties League Premier Division South title with a 7-0 win against Eynesbury Rovers.

Sphinx won all of the last eleven league matches to close a big gap at the top and become champions. We scored 106 goals and ended the season three points clear of runners-up Rugby Town to confirm promotion to the Northern Premier League Midlands Division. 2023/24 is our first ever season at Step 4.

Football never stands still. Local football in Coventry has declined over the years, so to be playing at our highest ever level after more than seventy years is an achievement of which the players, officials and supporters of our club can be proud.

The structure in place at senior, youth and junior levels for both men and women promises a bright future for Coventry Sphinx as we work towards the progress Willie Knibbs' memory deserves.





COVENTRY SPHINX O SPORTING KHALSA 1

Pitching In NPL Division One Midlands

Tuesday 22nd August 2023

Coventry Sphinx got their first taste of Step Four defeat on an otherwise encouraging night under the lights at the Sphinx Industrial Supplies Arena. Sporting Khalsa held on to a 1-0 lead to see out a second half dominated by Sphinx's push for an equaliser.

Joint managers John Woodward and Shaun Thomas opted to start with both Callum Martin and the returning Jordan Hayward on the left. Joe Pursey played on the other flank and the defence was completed by Callum Whiteside and stand-in skipper Louis Guest.

Luke Downes and Jack Downes both started again while Max Johnson came back into the starting line -up with captain Callum Woodward unavailable.

Kyle Carey played off striker Matty Shipman and there was a debut in goal for new signing Zach Hedge, who came in with Keelan Fallows also unavailable.

Sphinx did themselves proud with their best performance yet in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands but were ultimately on the wrong end of a 1-0 result that could so easily have turned out better.

The home team sought to catch Khalsa cold from the start and were competitive right from the off.

They had some joy up front in the first few minutes as they hunted an early lead.

The home team played with excellent balance against tough opponents. They met the physical challenge head-on – it was by far the best

Hayward's fine wing work led to a chance in the third minute, Johnson firing over after Carey had kept Hayward's cross alive at the back post.

Hayward took the next shot on himself as a positive start began to look like an excellent one. Khalsa goalkeeper Sam Arnold had to field his right -footed shot after he cut in from the left flank. With Sphinx seeming more connected up front than at any other point so far this season and standing up well to the more experienced and more physical visitors, they looked likeliest to score the game's first goal.

Instead it was Khalsa who took the lead and the first goal was also the last. In the 17th minute the ball was rolled across from the left for Curvin Sanderson-Ellis, who smartly tucked it past Hedge and into the top corner.

The hosts were briefly knocked off their stride by the goal and were more ragged for a spell in the middle of the first half. Their best attempt of the period came from a piece of good fortune. Sphinx got lucky with a ball going loose in a dangerous area and right back Pursey's piledriver had to be saved well by Arnold at his near post.

Hedge was in action a few minutes later, getting a glove on a powerful shot to turn it onto the bar. As the game grew ever more heated, Khalsa played some neat football in midfield and produced a few half chances but little of note.

Sphinx were by no means second best. Five minutes before half time Arnold had to thwart Shipman's shot on the turn as the home team piled on the pressure, and three minutes after that Carey's clever play from a Sphinx throw-in culminated in the forward making a yard for a left-footed shot that whipped just wide of the post.

Woodward and Thomas were forced into a change at half time. Luke Downes was withdrawn and replaced by Sam Ellis, who was instrumental in the first clear chance of the second half.

His fine turn in the build-up helped to create the opening for Hayward eight minutes into the half. He drilled the shot left-footed across goal and it ended up going just wide. Sphinx, though, were in the midst of another lively start and Khalsa were struggling to keep them at bay.

The home team played with excellent balance against tough opponents. They met the physical challenge head-on – it was by far the best performance of the nascent season by that measure – and played incisive attacking football in the search for an equalising goal.

Hayward took the next shot on himself as a positive start began to look like an excellent one. Khalsa goalkeeper Sam Arnold had to field his right -footed shot after he cut in from the left flank.

The assistant referee watched the whole thing unfold right in front of him and steadfastly kept his flag down from beginning to end. Khalsa's complaints alerted the referee and the goal was chalked off when it was established that the ball had made its way to Parker directly from a block by Shipman. Cue tardy flag.

They say it's the hope that kills you. Really it's the full minute when you're allowed to believe erroneously that the hope has been fulfilled.

By now Sphinx were firing on all cylinders and putting together what was a superb performance in the second half. For the last quarter of an hour

they turned the screw with increasing intensity, yet the one serious opening they needed never really dropped for them.



Indeed, the best chance in those final few minutes was a thumping header from a Khalsa corner that forced Hedge to make the best save of the match in the penultimate minute. For all the effort, Sphinx couldn't find a reply in stoppage time and suffered their first league defeat.



Despite the result, Sphinx's showing against Khalsa was pleasing.

They tore out of the blocks to have a pop at one of the better teams in the division last season, then made them work extremely hard to hold on for the win after a rousing second half.

The first NPL win is yet to arrive but the players look more suited to this level week by week, adjusting to the speed and physicality of the matches.

They're fast learners – this was only the third game and on another night it might even have gone entirely the other way.

Thomas and Woodward's team now move into a busy August Bank Holiday weekend, starting with a long Saturday trip to Spalding United and concluding with a Monday afternoon home fixture against neighbours Bedworth United.

The Daniel Wilkinson Foundation is a charity set up in memory of Daniel Wilkinson who died in 2016 aged 24, while playing the game he loved, from an underlying heart condition called Arrhythmogenic Right Ventricular Cardiomyopathy (ARVC).



Dan played football from an early age and joined Hull City AFC when he was 10, earning a professional contract aged 18. Loughborough University followed where he completed a degree in Accounting and Financial Management while playing non-league football. He was an athlete who enjoyed the gym and took his health and nutrition very seriously. He lived life to the full and had so much ahead of him.

Other than feeling light-headed on a few occasions in the month before he died, he had no symptoms!

BEDWORTH UNITED

History

The first Bedworth Town football club was formed in 1895 when several matches were played against other local teams. They became founder members of the Nuneaton and District League in 1898, but by 1900 the club had disbanded.

Finishing runners up in the Second Division of the Coventry and North Warwickshire League in the 1904-05 season, the ECS changed their name to Bedworth Town on winning promotion and stayed in existence until the early 1920s. During that time, the town fielded a fine player in Jack 'Sandy' Sheldon who later played for Manchester United. Liverpool and Luton Town.

A third club came on the scene in 1925, when Collycroft United, formed in 1916, became the third team to name themselves Bedworth Town.

This was the most successful of the pre-war clubs, they were members of the Coventry and North Warwickshire League and spent one season in 1936-37 in the Central Amateur League.

The last club to become Bedworth Town was formed in 1947, and as a semi-professional club, secured membership of the Birmingham Combination and soon hit the headlines. They won the championship in successive seasons - 1948-49 and 1949-50 seasons and in the 1949-50 season were also defeated in the final of the Birmingham Senior Cup.

For season 1954-55, Bedworth ioined the Birmingham League and they qualified for the Northern Section for the league's inaugural First Division. The Birmingham League was re-named the West Midlands League in 1962, but lack of success and problems off the field saw Bedworth Town change their name to Bedworth United in 1968.

In 1972 they obtained membership for the Southern League Division One North.

In their first season they finished bottom, but this was only to be a setback as they made rapid strides into the Premier Division when the league was re-formed in 1982.

In the Premier Division, they finished 5th in 1982-83 season, and were stable in this league until a poor run saw them relegated at the end of the 1988-89 season.

On February 23rd 1982, the nonleague world was staggered when a crowd of 5,172 - then a record for the Southern League in its new form - turned up at their Oval ground to watch them beat Nuneaton Borough 1-0 to go top of the league.

After becoming Bedworth United, they won the Birmingham Senior Cup on three occasions in the 1980s and were beaten finalists to West Bromwich Albion in the 1987-88 season.

Bedworth United were relegated to the Southern League Midland Division in 1988-89 season until the appointment of St Lucia-born Brendan Phillips as manager in 1990 launched a revival in the club's fortunes.

From 1990 to 1997, the Greenbacks pushed for promotion back to the Southern League's top flight and enjoyed a top six finish in four of the next five seasons. Phillips was tempted to move to Stafford Rangers during the 1992-93 season but progress was continued under the helm of former Notts County midfielder Dean Thomas.

Unfortunately, achieving the heady heights of a third place finish in the

1995-96 season, the club overstretched itself financially - and they faced possible closure until a group of die-hards acted to keep the club alive

After that, the Greenbacks occupied a bottom half finish for 14 seasons until the appointment In May, 2011, of a bright, forward-thinking management team led by Steve Farmer, assistant Adam Cooper, and the experienced Ian Roper on the field.

In his first season, Farmer - at 31 the youngest manager in the club's history - led them to their first promotion in their 65-year semiprofessional history.

After finishing in a highly-creditable third place, they won promotion after beating Uxbridge 2-1 in a semifinal play-off, and defeating Beaconsfield SYCOB 3-1 in the final.

Sadly, the fledgling manager showed his inexperience by changing his promotion-winning team from the start and it culminated in the club lasting just one season back in the Southern League Premier Division as they finished in 21st place and went down on goal difference

2013-14 The Greenbacks played in the Evo Stick Northern League Division One South, Andrew Fuller took over as Manager, however he resigned after a few weeks and was replaced by Nick Hawkins who unfortunately was unable to improve 2017/2018 Saw the team struggle in the results.

He was then replaced by our current Manager, Stuart Storer along with Andy Penny as his assistant. Both came from Hinckley United. After a

difficult start they produced a settled squad and staved off relegation at the end of the season.

2014-15 The Greenbacks returned to the Southern Football League, Stuart Storer remained as manager and in his first full season in charge the club once again won promotion after a 2-0 win over Barton Rovers in the playoff final. This was after finishing 4th after the league programme had been finished. This was the clubs first season on its new artificial grass

2015-16 The club played once again in the Southern Football League Premier Division. The season started slowly and a number of changes to playing staff made up until Christmas.

The club pushed to avoid relegation but ultimately were unsuccessful, although all agree this was due to the start of the season and not the group of players at the club at the end. We have now returned to the Northern Premier League Division 1

The 2016-17 season saw the club play once again in the Northern Premier League Division 1 South. A season that saw a number of injury problems and changes in playing staff saw a mid-table finish. The club did have a successful run in the FA Cup, eventually losing out to National League side Curzon Ashton. The 2022/23 was on reflection an

the league early on with injuries and Stuart Storer was unable to field the same team for 2 games in a row. Come Christmas though with the team becoming more settled results started to come and the Greenbacks

push saw them finish 4th in the league and make the playoffs where they met Chasetown in the semi final running out 2-1 winners to book a place against Stamford in the final.

Bedworth eventually won 2-1 after extra time after conceding 7 minutes into injury time. With the restructuring of the Leagues Bedworth were now promoted into the Evo Stik Southern premier league central. Unfortunately this foray into step 3 of the Non League ladder was short lived and the team were relegated back to step 4 at the end of the 2018/19 season.

In the Season that never was due to Covid-19 The Greenbacks were getting a head of steam up and were looking like they might have made the play offs but with the season being brought to a premature halt Bedworth would start the 2020-21 season in step 4 again.

Bedworth started well in the 2020-21 season only suffering defeat in the games they played and were sitting second in the league when again due to Covid the season was curtailed.

After a poor start to the 2021/22 season a good run in December and January saw the Greenbacks come within touching distance of the playoffs but a poor ending to the season saw them finish 12th.

In my bedroom in the house I lived in between the ages of ten and sixteen there was a large see-through plastic storage box.

In this box sat a couple of hundred matchday programmes, the amassed souvenirs of matches at AFC Bournemouth and Aston Villa throughout my childhood.

There were only two programmes from games I hadn't attended. The first was a thin, yellowing paper number from a pre-season friendly at Dean Court that happened before I'd even been to a football match and was presumably watched by my dad.

The other, a copy of the *Villa News & Record* from an historic UEFA Cup win against Inter Milan, was picked up by my uncle.

Every other programme in that box was mine. For every game a programme and a programme for every game.

Many were signed before Bournemouth fixtures by the likes of Scott Mean, Vince Bartram, Steve Fletcher, Scott Murray, Neil Masters, Steve Jones and who even knows who else. Efan Ekoku, probably. Maybe even Buster Merryfield. They should have been prized possessions but the truth is they were disorganised and badly kept and I have no idea whatsoever what became of them. None.

I feel a little guilty about that but certainly not regretful. I'm not a football programme collector.

I don't have the necessary internal wiring to understand the attraction of stockpiling something big enough that a serious collection demands you rent it a flat. I don't have the space in my house or my brain.

Admittedly, there is a modest collection building just over my left shoulder as I type. It contains every home programme from Coventry Sphinx since the beginning of the 2018/19 season. Somewhere on the property is stashed an unloved bag full of Tooting & Mitcham United programmes from 2011/12.

Turns out I do care when I make them myself. Anyway, as a non-league programme editor I have huge respect for the collector even if I'm not one myself.

As a sociologist I'm intrigued by them. What is it that makes these bizarre little magazines – and all manner of other

memorabilia for which we'll continue to use programmes as a proxy – so important?

Some people just have to collect. Psychologists sometimes describe it as an urge or an impulse.

Sigmund Freud (a collector of a few things, incidentally) theorised that it's associated with childhood toilet training challenges and – *and!* – as a "redirection of surplus libido onto an inanimate object".

The English game has a handful of Holy Grail programmes. Original copies from matches like the 1966 World Cup Final or the 1968 European Cup Final can move for hundreds or thousands of pounds because they have the three things a collector needs: they're scarce records of history in a quantifiable series.

There's something about scarcity that strikes at the collector's very soul.

In the early 1990s Russell W. Belk, an American academic and consumer behaviour expert, linked the act of collecting to possessiveness, materialism and a need for control.

Programme collecting is a good example of why that connection – while Belk makes no claim that it's universal – exists.

A more recent study of the links between collecting and adaptive evolution found that collecting might enhance "survival and reproductive success".

That's right, folks. Programme collectors are sexy devils.

Rarity breeds exclusivity. Exclusivity breeds demand, then desire, then realisation and possession.

Collecting objects like football programmes packs a thrill beyond the worth of the items themselves, including, occasionally, as a quite real investment.

One of the overlooked strengths of ye olde matchday programme is as a record of history.

It's documentary evidence in the most literal sense; it's full of information that serves both as an historical snapshot and a source of knowledge about what came before it. News, match reports, results, even statistical data are listed for the ages.

As a record of the past, the document itself is arguably even more important than the details within. The most potent collectibles are those with a pronounced emotional bent and football programmes have that sewn up.

Programmes connect us. To our clubs. To one another. To football culture in a much broader sense. Even for non-collectors they're often part of the matchday ritual.

That's why I had so many as a kid. It's also why I produce one now, years after they stopped being mandatory in our former league.

As football supporters we trade on memories and moments – the stories we tell about the teams and players we love and hate, and the sights and sounds and smells that can only come from being there. It naturally follows that it's spawned an enormous nostalgia satellite economy.

What proportion of the people who buy programmes are collecting the object and how many are instead collecting the moment?

Programmes are proof of attendance and it's the attendance, the experience, that actually counts. Just ask any one of Britain's legion of groundhoppers.

For them and other collectors printed football programmes exist as a measurable series to tick off. They're like Panini stickers except you don't need to sell a kidney to fill up a season's worth.

Matchday programmes form sets and subsets, date-stamped if not numbered, and therefore offer the prospect of completion. Freud would have loved that.

Academics usually agree that collecting involves a personal challenge and sense of achievement – it's a competition against ourselves.

Studies (including a series of experiments a decade ago by human resource management academic Howard J. Klein and the wonderfully named social psychologist Zlatan Krizan) show that self-competition is crucial to the achievement of our individual goals. When we play games against ourselves, we're driven by the will to win.

Acquiring a programme collection that would sink a small boat isn't for me but I completely understand the impulse.

In many ways, it's strange that I don't buy them. I value programmes massively as proof of the enduring demand for physical media, as contemporary records and as a social ritual in a sport whose primary role is, to me, to provide precisely that

The NLP has been invited along to see what we'd traditionally know as a ground grading at Steps 1-4 was handled grading in action.

Launched at the end of July, the FA and Premier League have joined forces to launch the Stadium Accreditation Programme. For the first time since ground grading was introduced over 15 years ago, the process has been digitalised with a new tool called StadiumPower.

Think of this process as a giant audit of Non-League grounds to essentially answer the questions: What have we got? Where are the challenges and areas of need? And, crucially, how can funding be best utilised?

"Up until now, although many will be surprised at this, there has been no central database capturing not just facility information but also the nuances around it." Mark Harris, chairman of The FA's Stadium Accreditation subcommittee, tells The NLP.

"So digitalisation will give us a central database of facilities. It will allow us to identify areas of non-compliance but, more importantly, look at common areas of non-compliance.

"It's about identifying big issues that can then be linked to funding. I don't want to With the app, photos and videos can now set any hares running but, as an example, if we found there were high numbers of perimeter fencing not compliant for whatever reason, that

together to talk to funding partners like the Premier League Stadium Fund and opening up their ground for assessment. say: There is a common need here. Let's look at whether we should focus some funding on the bigger problems club

> "It is not there as a bigger stick to beat clubs with. It's to bring transparency and also ensure impartiality."

That and consistency are key. Previously, centrally by The FA, with Steps 5 and 6 overseen by leagues themselves.

Naturally, and understandably, that has led to a variation across the country.

Stadium Accreditation assessors - 25 of them all trained together - are now undertaking the mammoth task to visit around 820 individual National League System grounds.

As part of this year one assessment, at least 400 individual items at each stadium are being recorded — of those, 160 linked to the ground grading criteria for 2023-24

There are nine sections to be filled in by the assessor, accompanied by a league

It starts with general information like ground details and who uses the pitch.

Then entrances and exits, clubhouse details, how big is the clubhouse and how many can it hold. Spectator information and capacities, standing and seating. Others areas include Medical & Safety, Pitch & Floodlights, Transport & Parking, Media & Broadcast.

An important note, nothing in respect to the actual grading criteria has changed. But the in-depth collection of data will be reviewed by The FA's now monthlymeeting Stadium Accreditation Sub

"It may well be that arising from this first round of inspections that it actually highlights some changes we may need to think about making to criteria going forward," Harris says.

StadiumPower will allow clubs to keep tabs on their own improvements, give transparency on other clubs and there will be a public-facing element so the everyday fan can see what facilities they

Another feature of the app will be a stadium simulation tool where a club can, at the click of a button, see what work is required should they be promoted to the level above.

"This is about trying to move the mindset from compliance to opportunity," Harris

Nearly three hours on and there are still areas to be looked at, measured and photographed. But it's another one ticked off the list with the vision for a stronger Non-League game at the end of
