Last Saturday was the first time in a long time I felt we came up short in a match. There have been tough ones to take in the last few years, not least the recent losses at Spalding United and Sutton Coldfield Town, but in most cases there have been mitigating factors and flashes of encouragement.

But I left Farley Way completely gutted because I know we can do more. I know we didn't show the real Coventry Sphinx in that performance in the FA Trophy. I know Quorn aren't four goals better than we are.

Injuries, the heat and a challenging run of form all played their part but this was a game full of regrets and, I believe, one that isn't representative of this Sphinx team. These players can do so much more.

Since our last home game we've had a difficult spell. Goals have leaked at one end and dried up at the other. Suddenly, we're not going toe to toe with top teams but being rolled over by teams that aren't as good as them.

This is where the positive side of the Trophy defeat comes in. The dust has settled and the knowledge that we're a more capable side than we showed last week is a big reason for confidence not to drop as we move into this second phase of the season.

Every player in our squad has the ability to play at this level. The period of acclimatisation is over and now the time has come to show it. Not as individual players, or as a team, but as a club. We earned the right to be here. Let's prove ourselves again.

Today's opponents have been on quite the journey to this point themselves, of course. Presumably every programme they read this season will remind them where Rushden & Diamonds were twenty years ago. No football supporter should have to

withstand what followed but I'm full of respect and admiration for supporters who keep their club's name alive. AFC Rushden & Diamonds were founded in 2011 and Rushden & Diamonds supporters have a football club. When push comes to shove, that's all that matters.

With that, we welcome those supporters along with the Diamonds players, management and officials for this afternoon's Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands fixture at the Sphinx Industrial Supplies Arena.

It goes without saying that both of these teams could do with a win and I expect that to be reflected in the intensity of today's game on the pitch. It should be an absolute cracker.

Sphinx's cup exits mean we now (at the time of writing) have two weeks between this match and the next. Last year's visit to Butlin Road was a high point of our title win. Really, it was where it all began. I don't think we're too popular there now.

We go to Rugby Town two weeks from today before four important league fixtures in the month of October. We host Corby Town on Saturday 7th and then three former Step Five league opponents lie in wait.

Coleshill Town's return to Sphinx Drive on Saturday 21st will be sandwiched between trips to the East Midlands. We're away at Shepshed Dynamo on Saturday 14th and the previous United Counties League Premier Division South winners on 28th.

Harborough Town have gone from strength to strength since their promotion. Our game there at the end of October will reveal a lot. Everything I know about Sphinx tells me we'll have moved forward by the time we get there. Up the Sphinx.

Programme Editor



The history of Coventry Sphinx began in 1946. Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft FC had been highly successful in the city before and during the Second World War and changed their name to Sphinx FC.

AWA's legacy was replicated by the new club. Sphinx won a number of league and cup competitions throughout the 1950s and 1960s before playing a major role in the formation of the Coventry Alliance and continuing to win trophies in the following decades.

Coventry underwent significant socioeconomic change in the 1990s. The recession led to the closure of factories in the city and surrounding areas, which in turn led to the dissolution of many of Coventry's football clubs. Sphinx needed a new challenge and joined the Midland Combination Football League in 1993.

In our first season in the Midland Combination we were promoted from Division 2 and reached the semi-finals of the Birmingham Sunday Vase. A second consecutive promotion followed thanks to a second-placed finish in Division 1 the next season.

With promotion to the top division of the Midland Combination secured it was decided that the club should be linked more closely to our city. We became Coventry Sphinx and the first match under our new name was against a Coventry City XI at our home ground.

Throughout its history, our club has been served by countless loyal and hard-working local people who've contributed enormously to Coventry Sphinx on and off the field. Through their dedication we

have achieved some unbeatable highs. There have also been times of great tragedy.

In November 2001, Sphinx manager Willie Knibbs was killed in a car accident on the way home from a cup match at Meir KA. Willie was a former Sphinx player in his second spell as manager. His death was a terrible loss to our club and to local football in Coventry.

After a painful season, Sphinx went on to win the Midland Combination Challenge Cup and it was renamed the Willie Knibbs Cup as a mark of respect. Our main stand is also named in Willie's honour.

Sphinx became one of the leading teams in the Midland Combination Premier League, finishing as runners-up in our first season and again in both 2005 and 2006. We reached the final of the Endsleigh Challenge Cup on three occasions, losing to Alveston at Villa Park in 1999 but beating Coventry Marconi in 2003 and Feckenham in 2005.

We also won the Coventry Evening Telegraph Cup in successive seasons, making Sphinx the last winners of the competition at Highfield Road and the first at the Ricoh Arena.

Although first team success is a driving force, the heartbeat of our club is the thriving junior section. Formed in 1997, it started with just three teams and has grown ever since. There are now hundreds of players representing Coventry Sphinx and we were the first club in Coventry to achieve the FA Charter.

Our youth team started competing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League in 2003 and one of the

biggest successes to date came in the 2014/15 season, when they won the double after suffering only one league defeat and beating Stourbridge 3-0 in the Birmingham County FA Midweek Floodlit Youth Cup.

Under manager Paul Charnley, Coventry Sphinx's men's first team completed a remarkable treble achievement in May 2007.

In addition to finally becoming champions of the Midland Football Combination – achieving promotion to the Midland Football Alliance in the process – Sphinx won the Coventry Charity Cup and the BCFA Midland Floodlit Cup.

The 2007/08 season saw Sphinx enjoy our best ever run in the FA Vase, reaching the quarter-final for the very first time and losing controversially to Kirkham & Wesham, the eventual Wembley winners, in a replay at Sphinx Drive.

We made a run to the semi-finals of the League Cup in the same season and went on to win the Midland Alliance Polymac League Cup by beating Westfields in the final in 2009/10.

In 2014/15 the club was honoured to become a founder member of the Midland Football League Premier Division. After a top ten finish under Stuart Dutton, Lee Knibbs took over as manager in the autumn of 2017.

Lee is the son of Willie Knibbs and returned to the club after an earlier spell as assistant manager to Danny McSheffrey.

He guided Sphinx to some of our most memorable results of the decade before deciding to step aside in November 2019.

Knibbs was succeeded by his assistants, John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, who became the club's joint managers and ended the truncated 2019/20 season on a long unbeaten run, the foundation of Sphinx's greatest achievement to come.

Sphinx made a sideways move as part of FA restructuring ahead of the 2021/22 season, competing in a newly formed Premier Division South in the United Counties League.

In our first season we finished in fourth place, losing only twice in the second half of the season, and enjoyed a long run in the FA Vase, narrowly missing out on another quarter-final.

The following season saw Sphinx lose on penalties again in the same round of the FA Vase but 2022/23 was the best season in our history.

In the space of one week in April, our club acquired the freehold to the Sphinx Drive ground for the very first time and secured the United Counties League Premier Division South title with a 7-0 win against Eynesbury Rovers.

Sphinx won all of the last eleven league matches to close a big gap at the top and become champions. We scored 106 goals and ended the season three points clear of runners-up Rugby Town to confirm promotion to the Northern Premier League Midlands Division. 2023/24 is our first ever season at Step 4.

Football never stands still. Local football in Coventry has declined over the years, so to be playing at our highest ever level after more than seventy years is an achievement of which the players, officials and supporters of our club can be proud.

The structure in place at senior, youth and junior levels for both men and women promises a bright future for Coventry Sphinx as we work towards the progress Willie Knibbs' memory deserves.



SPALDING UNITED 4 COVENTRY SPHINX

Pitching In NPL **Division One Midlands** Saturday 26th August 2023

Coventry Sphinx suffered a comprehensive defeat on a difficult Saturday afternoon against a very strong Spalding United team.

As well as facing the highest quality Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands opposition to date. Sphinx had to contend with a late arrival. delayed kick-off and the unavailability of two thirds of the usual front three.

With goalkeeper Keelan Fallows also away, Zach Hedge continued to deputise. Louis Guest and Callum Whiteside started at the back with Joe Pursey, with Jordan Hayward and Callum Martin at wing back.

Jack Downes and Max Johnson played in the centre of midfield, while captain Callum Woodward was pushed forward to play off Dylan Parker with both Matty Shipman and Kyle Carey unable to travel. There was also a first start for Sam Ellis in midfield.



Hindered by imperfect preparation, it was obvious from the start that Sphinx would have their work cut out against a team who should expect to be competing at the top end of the Midlands division in 2023/24 just as they did last term.

Spalding were tidy and robust, extremely organised in possession, and quickly took control of a match that would remain in their grasp for the duration. Sphinx were under the cosh early on and a goal for the Tulips in the tenth minute made sure they weren't able to withstand the pressure for long.

James Clifton fired the opening goal in off the crossbar from inside the penalty area after Hedge had initially made a decent save.

After more pressure from the home team, Sphinx managed to get on the ball much more in the middle of the first half. Spalding carried the threat, however, and a quiet spell was punctuated by another Hedge save, this time a fine tip over the crossbar to thwart a powerful effort from distance.



A couple of half chances later. Spalding doubled their lead. In the 35th minute Lewis Hilliard's corner kick from the Tulips' left curled beyond everyone in the box and found the far corner. It had all the hallmarks of a dangerous delivery but it's not a type of goal managers like to concede. It left Sphinx with it all to do.

Hedge had to save again to keep the deficit at two with six minutes left in the first half, which ended with yellow cards for Woodward and Pursey. Spalding were good value for their 2-0 lead at the break, ahead on merit, but Sphinx had more to

Thomas and Woodward's men made a much brighter start to the second half, culminating in a shot from Johnson that was blocked. The visitors had more possession after half time and, as usual, looked much more effective when they had a platform to play a bit.

Even in the good moments, Sphinx found it difficult to make chances at one end and limit them at the other. Hedge parried another driven effort just

before the hour even as Sphinx - while there was always the sense they were being kept at arm's length - continued to move the ball well.

Sphinx's joint managers introduced three of their four substitutes with 25 minutes left on the clock.

Luke Downes replaced Sam Ellis, who played 65 minutes on his first league start for the club. Dawid Peplinski came on for Martin, resulting in a shift from right to left for Hayward, and captain Woodward made way for Antonio Cristofaro.

Two minutes later Spalding made it 3-0 through a substitute of their own. Jordan Graham is a player of some pedigree and his left-footed drive into the top corner of Hedge's net was unstoppable.



The second half was better than the first from a Sphinx point of view but Spalding added a fourth goal with five minutes remaining. Clifton, who started the scoring, ended it too.

He pounced on a split-second lapse at the back and produced a neat finish to beat Hedge and roll the ball over the line.

Hayward had to leave the field injured in the final minute and Cristofaro drew a save from Spalding goalkeeper Tony Breeden with a 25-yard curling shot in the fifth minute of time added on, but the game was long gone.

It was ultimately a heavy defeat for Sphinx and there's no doubt the home team deserved a comfortable win, but the fourth goal added a dimension to the scoreline that wasn't quite in keeping with the match.

Sphinx were up against it with key forward players missing and their delayed preparation didn't help.

The truth for promoted teams in any division is that they need to have an almost perfect day to get anything out of the top teams away from home. This day was anything but perfect.

The fourteen players who were on the pitch gave everything, as they are expected to at Coventry Sphinx.

The step up in intensity was more evident than ever and it was a tough challenge that they embraced fully.

In the end, they were handsomely beaten by a quality side. Next up in the NPL Midlands is a home game against neighbours Bedworth United on Bank Holiday Monday.

AFC RUSHDEN & DIAMONDS

CLUB HISTORY

AFC Rushden & Diamonds were formed in July 2011 following the demise of Rushden & Diamonds FC as a supporter-owned, supporter-run football club.

After a season in youth football in 2011/12 they were allocated a place in the United Counties League Division One for 2012/13 (Step 6 of Non-League Football). Diamonds gained promotion in second spot in that league at the end of their first season and followed that with third place in the UCL Premier Division before winning the title in the 2014/15 season, backed up with the League Cup. This meant they won promotion to the Southern Football League Division One Central at Step 4.


In 2015/16 Diamonds finished fifth in the SL1C, reaching the play-off final and winning their County Cup. They were transferred to the Northern Premier League First Division South for the 2016/17 season where they again reached the end of season play-offs.


For 2017/18 they returned to the Southern League to play in Division One East, known as EVO-Stik League South, East, winning promotion at the end of that season to Step 3 of Non-League Football.

For the next 5 seasons Diamonds played in the Southern League Premier Division Central and finished the 2021/22 season in 6th place, missing out on the final playoff spot on the last day of the season.

The 2022/23 campaign proved to be the undoing for the Diamonds, eventually leading to their relegation to Step 4 of the Non-League Football pyramid.

LAST WEEK, I had the pleasure of speaking to a young man whose life had been turned upside down due to one innocuous moment on the football field.

"I went in for a 50/50 ball, nothing at all sinister, and ended up with his shin wrapped around his leg" Ashford United winger said Adem Ramadan speaking of the incident which occurred during the Nuts & Bolts' Bank Holiday Monday derby clash with Hythe Town.

"I went to get up and my leg just folded. It was just one of those things - an unlucky accident."

Sadly for Adem, that 'unlucky accident' had far-reaching consequences. The 27-year-old was taken to hospital with a horrific double leg break – an injury has now ruled him out of football for up to a year but, more importantly, forced him out of work, as a self-employed electrician, for the next six months.

Thankfully for Adem, an Isthmian League insurance policy through his club - coupled with a GoFundMe page set up by family and friends - Adem won't suffer too much in the way of undue financial hardship during his long period of recovery. It's hard for him to comprehend at the moment, but he is actually one of the lucky ones.

Adem told me of one of his teammates at Ashford who has just bought his first family home for his new wife and two young children. What if it was he whose leg buckled over and wasn't quite so lucky?

"Hindsight is a wonderful thing," Ramadan, the former Margate and Folkestone Invicta midfielder said. "You always think 'it won't happen to me', but it could, so easily.

"It makes you realise just how important it is for players of any level really to get protected. There are personal insurances

out there for between £7 and £10 a month. In hindsight, I'd have definitely paid that knowing what I know now.

"I'm a single man so, as a result, I don't have to worry too much about paying the bills while I'm off work. It's a huge weight off my shoulders.

"But if the same happens to my teammate it might be a different story and that's why I would urge players to get some advice and at least look into getting insured and protecting themselves.

"Paying £7-£10 a month, or whatever, is nothing compared to the risk of losing your house. It could be the best money you've ever spent."

One man who knows just how Adem is feeling right now is Francis Duku.
Then at Gravesend & Northfleet, the 24-year-old had just been part of their 2001-02 Isthmian Premier title win and his performances were getting noticed.

"I was getting a lot of attention and, maybe, going back into the pro game," our old friend Duku told The NLP back in March. "But I broke my leg in pre-season at Weymouth. I had no idea it was broken. It was an attempt at an overhead clearance – it was hot and I didn't want to keep running so I thought I could hook it away and take a breather!"

An X-ray back in London showed a broken ankle and he was booked in for an op. "The guy who did it, fixed me as if I was a non-athlete – put pins in my ankle, which created loads of scar tissue and my ankle was never the same again. To this day you can see the difference. I still did alright, but I wasn't the level I was before."

Duku was able to use private medical care through his work in the city but it set the cogs whirring for Our Game Football, a membership service created to ensure that UK football has access to a minimum level of care and support. For as little as £1 to register, members have access to affordable insurance policies as well as a whole network of benefits – and clubs can benefit too.

"There's a real motive to provide a route for change who want it," Duku says. "We've spoken to people time and again, they look at me and say, 'I get it, I get it'. But they don't want to do anything; players, chairmen, managers.

"For me, it's crazy. You know if you're playing football, you're going to get injured. You see GoFundMe pages from someone who is self-employed and needs to be on their feet to work, maybe they've got a young family. Everyone has shortfalls to cover. Rather than put structures in place, people choose to go that fundraising route.

"I am not here to lecture. But clearly there is a better route and that's what Our Game has built."

Our Game have also also launch Project 250 where if every member club can get 250 people to register as part as your community, a digital infrastructure is in place to help them create insurance benefits to cover costs of wages, contract liabilities or medical expenses when players are injured.

Whatever your financial position and whatever level you play, firms like Our Game can prove a lifeline to sportspeople everywhere in their hour of need. Don't delay, get yourself covered. As Adem says, it could be the best money you've ever spent.

COVENTRY SPHINX BEDWORTH UNITED

Pitching In NPL **Division One Midlands** Monday 28th August

After the thudding reality check of defeat at Spalding United, Coventry Sphinx were eager to pick up their first win in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands when they hosted neighbours Bedworth United on Bank Holiday Monday.

For the second home match in a row Sphinx were on the wrong end of a single goal. Joint managers John Woodward and Shaun Thomas can certainly claim to have been the better team against Sporting Khalsa but a dearth of real chances in front of goal meant that Bedworth, though they had to work for the win, were seldom in danger of giving up their slender lead.

Sphinx were short-handed once more. Matty Shipman and Keelan Fallows remained unavailable, Kyle Carey was unable to play and Jordan Hayward's injury in the previous match kept him out of this one.

Woodward and Thomas started with Zach Hedge in goal behind Joe Pursey, Callum Whiteside, Louis Guest and Callum Martin in defence, Luke Downes came into the midfield alongside lack Downes. Max Johnson and captain Callum Woodward, and there was a first start for Antonio Cristofaro off striker Dvlan Parker.

Though absorbing, this wasn't a game for the purists. Goalmouth action was at a premium, shots on target few and far between. In that regard it was a typical derby match.

It was Sphinx who generated the first chance of the The visitors saw a volley blasted wide from a match. Woodward's fine work created it for Cristofaro, who cut inside well but saw his shot easily saved by Bedworth goalkeeper Sam Lomax.

The visitors made their presence felt quickly, with lots of early pressure on the Sphinx defence. A sequence of long throw-ins and a corner kept the home team honest before a Greenbacks shot on the turn was deflected wide of goal in the tenth

But it wasn't one-way traffic. Sphinx had Bedworth working for everything. Another shot was deflected off target and, from the resulting corner, Whiteside and Hedge collided in the six-yard box.

Parker created it with a fine run before teeing up Cristofaro, who was unable to find the finish from close range. He did rather better in the 51st minute but his sharp run and shot didn't stretch Lomax in the Bedworth goal.

Just before Sphinx made some rearrangements to get an extra man up front and closer to Parker. captain Woodward fulfilled the role.

He drew the attention of Bedworth central defender Joe Mugunda, whose off-the-ball shenanigans in full view of the officials culminated in a kick and a stamp that should have led to a straight red card.

The unorthodox switch that followed brought centre back Dawid Peplinski off the bench to play up front with Parker, where he was an effective

challenge for Bedworth's aerial power and the catalyst for a good spell for the home team.

Despite this positive spell, Bedworth were the likelier scorers of a second goal against a Sphinx side who fell asleep too often two days after a long and difficult away trip.

Hedge made an easy save in the 70th minute and Sphinx's best move of the match took them straight to the other end, where Jack Downes smashed in a terrific cross. Parker headed wide but Sphinx continued to push.



Lomax's best save of the game came 15 minutes from time. Woodward delivered a long free kick and Guest did well to win the header and send the ball towards the bottom corner. It didn't have much on it but the Bedworth goalkeeper had to react quickly to get down in time.



After one final shot over the bar, Bedworth sought to take the sting out of the match through the last five minutes and a healthy chunk of stoppage time. When it comes to that particular task, there's nothing green about the Greenbacks.

If losing to Spalding was an eye opener, this defeat against Bedworth was an unwelcome glimpse of the familiar. Sphinx have had several tight games against Bedworth over the years and the truth is that some of them were closer than this.

Nevertheless, it's important that the players and management maintain their confidence.

They won't want to hear it again but Spalding aside, Sphinx have stepped up a level and competed in every game from the first whistle to the last.

They should have beaten Quorn, might have beaten Gresley Rovers and could have beaten high-flying Sporting Khalsa. A bad weekend with key players missing all over the pitch doesn't change that.

But the elusive first win has to come soon. Sphinx now revert to weekly Saturday matches for a while, the first being a visit to Sutton Coldfield Town and the second a vital tie against Quorn in the Isuzu FA Trophy.

Transfers aren't football and summers are rubbish

Football culture is fracturing. There are growing fault lines in a multitude of directions, each exacerbated by the tribal club loyalties that persistently chip away at any semblance of sane relations between supporters.

Within that monotonous fug lies an infinity of cracks. Between the polished elite sport and the game lower down. Between online fanatical weirdos and real-world participants. Between advocates and opponents of video assistant referees. Between those unwilling to endorse certain types of ownerships or politics or sponsors and those who simply define their football experience by winning.

If I listed out all of my football opinions, each would place me on the other side of a ravine from supporters of the opposite view. That much is obvious. But it also applies to preferences, likes, dislikes, tolerance levels – and that's pretty fascinating from a sociological perspective.

The same thing is happening in online culture. I used to work at a creative agency, We Are Social. In their 2023 *Think Forward* trends piece, they led with the idea of fragmentation in what defines online communities:

"On a cultural level, gone is the universal watercooler chat dictated by shared popular culture – today's agenda is set by ever-more niche and transient corners of the internet. And on a personal level, identities are more layered and fluid than ever before, more like an 'avatar du jour' than a static understanding of self."

The result is a sort of patchwork of cultural bits and pieces; an identity pick 'n' mix. As Facebook, Instagram and even Threads disappear up the recta that are their godforsaken algorithms, as Twitter nosedives into the dirt at the hands of

the world's most divorced dad, the places in which we gather online are changing.

People now congregate around increasingly specific strands of their identities. Subreddits and Discord servers are scooped up and dropped into our personality paper bags. A sports team here, a band there, a little art and professional interest and some laughs thrown in, and we can each build an online experience that reflects who we are and what we want from connected professional interest and some laughs thrown in, and we can each build an online experience that reflects who we are and what we want from connected professional interest and some laughs.

In football we at least retain that unified central point of interest, but no two ways of enjoying it are alike. We select the parts we like and don't like, and we each experience the game in our own way. That versatility helps to make the game special. It also means we can make these choices and decide how we interact with the game, flirting around the fringes of our personal football fiefdoms and getting into arguments about more or less anything.

Every summer we reach one of the edges of mine. If one of the dividing lines is between people who consider the summer transfer window to be a part of the spectacle and people who just want the football back, I'm ready to go full Braveheart in favour of the latter.

Transfers aren't football and summers are tedious. You will never persuade me otherwise.

This simmering distaste for transfer chatter is amplified by the absurd numbers and politics involved. Whether it's Saudi Arabia offering to make Kylian Mbappé richer than god twice over or just about any English player moving for upwards of £50m – to be clear, that is fifty million pounds – the whole thing seems to take on an almost abstract

With no basis in a sensible reality, the summer transfer market has no consequence. And, as all intelligent football supporters know, football without consequence is barely football at all

The eye-rolling tedium of transfer talk was highlighted during Bayern Munich's nakedly public courtship of England captain Harry Kane. With Tottenham Hotspur in Thailand at the start of their pre-season tour, manager Ange Postecoglou was faced with a press conference stunt by the risible German newspaper, *Bild*.

The awful rag's balding, bumfluff-bearded reporter, Max Schrader, later had his accreditation revoked for introducing into proceedings a Bayern jersey bearing Kane's name. Given the tepid nature of the gag, one can only assume the press ban received by Schrader was imposed on the grounds of weak patter. Even Bayern fans were annoyed.

That's the thing with these summer months of *mercato* back and forth.

They're full to bursting with crap jibes, baseless rumours, the baffling trend of 'ITK' fakery and circuitous discussion about nothing.

Lurking within all that nonsense is the actual transfer market – real updates about things that are really happening. Until a player is holding up their new shirt that's boring too, yet millions obsess over it for weeks and weeks, apparently enjoying it as much as, if not more than, the football itself.

The sainting and celebration of football's leading transfer hacks and whatever it was Jim White claimed to be is confusing to me. Football happens on the pitch. The rest is just admin, yet here we are living in a world in which Fabrizio Romano has a catchphrase.
