Our visitors arrive in excellent form away from home in the league this season and I expect them to have claimed their first home win from their midweek fixture by the time this programme goes

As well as a lot of new faces in opposition today, we have a few new signings who've joined us in the last few weeks as John and Shaun have sought to tweak and strengthen their playing staff.

Both Will Edjenguele and Finlay Shorrock played here against Rushden & Diamonds and will be familiar, but there were fresh additions on the bench at Butlin Road last Saturday.

The history of Coventry Sphinx began in 1946. Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft FC had been highly successful in the city before and during the Second World War and changed their name to Sphinx FC.

AWA's legacy was replicated by the new club. Sphinx won a number of league and cup competitions throughout the 1950s and 1960s before playing a major role in the formation of the Coventry Alliance and continuing to win trophies in the following decades.

Coventry underwent significant socioeconomic change in the 1990s. The recession led to the closure of factories in the city and surrounding areas, which in turn led to the dissolution of many of Coventry's football clubs. Sphinx needed a new challenge and joined the Midland Combination Football League in 1993.

In our first season in the Midland Combination we were promoted from Division 2 and reached the semi-finals of the Birmingham Sunday Vase. A second consecutive promotion followed thanks to a second-placed finish in Division 1 the next season.

With promotion to the top division of the Midland Combination secured it was decided that the club should be linked more closely to our city. We became Coventry Sphinx and the first match under our new name was against a Coventry City XI at our home ground.

Throughout its history, our club has been served by countless loyal and hard-working local people who've contributed enormously to Coventry Sphinx on and off the field. Through their dedication we

have achieved some unbeatable highs. There have also been times of great tragedy.

In November 2001, Sphinx manager Willie Knibbs was killed in a car accident on the way home from a cup match at Meir KA. Willie was a former Sphinx player in his second spell as manager. His death was a terrible loss to our club and to local football in Coventry.

After a painful season, Sphinx went on to win the Midland Combination Challenge Cup and it was renamed the Willie Knibbs Cup as a mark of respect. Our main stand is also named in Willie's honour.

Sphinx became one of the leading teams in the Midland Combination Premier League, finishing as runners-up in our first season and again in both 2005 and 2006. We reached the final of the Endsleigh Challenge Cup on three occasions, losing to Alveston at Villa Park in 1999 but beating Coventry Marconi in 2003 and Feckenham in 2005.

We also won the Coventry Evening Telegraph Cup in successive seasons, making Sphinx the last winners of the competition at Highfield Road and the first at the Ricoh Arena.

Although first team success is a driving force, the heartbeat of our club is the thriving junior section. Formed in 1997, it started with just three teams and has grown ever since. There are now hundreds of players representing Coventry Sphinx and we were the first club in Coventry to achieve the FA Charter.

Our youth team started competing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League in 2003 and one of the

biggest successes to date came in the 2014/15 season, when they won the double after suffering only one league defeat and beating Stourbridge 3-0 in the Birmingham County FA Midweek Floodlit Youth Cup.

Under manager Paul Charnley, Coventry Sphinx's men's first team completed a remarkable treble achievement in May 2007.

In addition to finally becoming champions of the Midland Football Combination – achieving promotion to the Midland Football Alliance in the process – Sphinx won the Coventry Charity Cup and the BCFA Midland Floodlit Cup.

The 2007/08 season saw Sphinx enjoy our best ever run in the FA Vase, reaching the quarter-final for the very first time and losing controversially to Kirkham & Wesham, the eventual Wembley winners, in a replay at Sphinx Drive.

We made a run to the semi-finals of the League Cup in the same season and went on to win the Midland Alliance Polymac League Cup by beating Westfields in the final in 2009/10.

In 2014/15 the club was honoured to become a founder member of the Midland Football League Premier Division. After a top ten finish under Stuart Dutton, Lee Knibbs took over as manager in the autumn of 2017.

Lee is the son of Willie Knibbs and returned to the club after an earlier spell as assistant manager to Danny McSheffrey.

He guided Sphinx to some of our most memorable results of the decade before deciding to step aside in November 2019.

Knibbs was succeeded by his assistants, John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, who became the club's joint managers and ended the truncated 2019/20 season on a long unbeaten run, the foundation of Sphinx's greatest achievement to come.

Sphinx made a sideways move as part of FA restructuring ahead of the 2021/22 season, competing in a newly formed Premier Division South in the United Counties League.

In our first season we finished in fourth place, losing only twice in the second half of the season, and enjoyed a long run in the FA Vase, narrowly missing out on another quarter-final.

The following season saw Sphinx lose on penalties again in the same round of the FA Vase but 2022/23 was the best season in our history.

In the space of one week in April, our club acquired the freehold to the Sphinx Drive ground for the very first time and secured the United Counties League Premier Division South title with a 7-0 win against Eynesbury Rovers.

Sphinx won all of the last eleven league matches to close a big gap at the top and become champions. We scored 106 goals and ended the season three points clear of runners-up Rugby Town to confirm promotion to the Northern Premier League Midlands Division. 2023/24 is our first ever season at Step 4.

Football never stands still. Local football in Coventry has declined over the years, so to be playing at our highest ever level after more than seventy years is an achievement of which the players, officials and supporters of our club can be proud.

The structure in place at senior, youth and junior levels for both men and women promises a bright future for Coventry Sphinx as we work towards the progress Willie Knibbs' memory deserves.





SUTTON COLDFIELD TOWN 4 COVENTRY SPHINX 1

Pitching In NPL Division One Midlands

Saturday 2nd September 2023

Coventry Sphinx's frustrating start to life in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands continued with their first loss from a winning position. After a 4-1 defeat at Sutton Coldfield Town, the search for a win goes on.

Sphinx were able to welcome back goalkeeper Keelan Fallows and striker Matty Shipman, both of whom went straight back into the starting eleven.

Joint managers John Woodward and Shaun Thomas moved Joe Pursey to right wing back in the absence of the injured Jordan Hayward, so Dawid Peplinski made his first Sphinx start in defence alongside Callum Whiteside and Louis Guest.



Pursey's opposite number on the left was Callum Martin, who ended the day in hospital after sustaining an ankle injury that thankfully turned out to be less serious than initially feared.

Shipman was paired up front with Dylan Parker, ahead of a midfield featuring a new face. New signing Jac Redhead started with Jack Downes and captain Callum Woodward.

Shipman's return and the introduction of Redhead made a big difference in the first half. After an even start with little in the way of chances, the Sphinx striker forced Royals goalkeeper Jonothan Brown into the first save of the match, whipping his effort towards the top corner after being teed up by Pursey.

All. The Royals brought their S to the fore in a clinical second.

They came out firing and Fallov before Sphinx eventually settle unsettled again by a long delay Martin. The wing back was stre

Sutton Coldfield played their way into the game with a patient move after quarter of an hour but their first effort of note sailed over. Sphinx went closer with the next attack, which led to Redhead chipping Brown from thirty yards only to see his improvised attempt drop just wide.

A few minutes later Sphinx had Brown working again, this time with a terrific move of their own. Redhead's pass out to the right for Parker was beautifully weighted. Parker cut it back for Shipman. The goalkeeper was able to hold on to his shot relatively easily.

Brown was also equal to Parker's strike after Shipman returned the favour but Sphinx were opening the home side up as an entertaining game emerged.

In the 25th minute the visitors wanted a penalty for a foul on Pursey, who was causing problems from his higher position on the right flank, before Sutton Coldfield went just over with a sharp shot on the turn.

The deadlock was broken with 27 minutes played. Parker's pass into the left channel for Shipman got a slight touch from a defender that seemed to take the sting out of it, playing right into the hands of Shipman as he went clear to collect the ball. He slotted it past Brown and into the far corner to put Sphinx in front.

The home team saw a volley go over the crossbar after a free kick but Sphinx were on top as half time approached. Playing good football in the Sutton Coldfield half, the visitors also looked dangerous on the break but just couldn't create the all-important opening for a second goal.

Fallows had to make a solid save with his feet a couple of minutes before half time at the end of a threatening break that had his team in real trouble. That problem dodged, there was no avoiding the stoppage time equaliser that knocked Sphinx for six.

Sam Fitzgerald's ambitious shot from distance had tons of venom in it and took a nick as it curled away from Fallows and into the corner. It took the wind out of the away team's sails after a good first half. The Royals brought their Step Four experience to the fore in a clinical second.

They came out firing and Fallows made one save before Sphinx eventually settled, only to be unsettled again by a long delay and the injury to Martin. The wing back was stretchered off ten minutes into the half, replaced by Leigh Phillips, and taken to hospital. The good news later was that his scans revealed no break.

The game lost its shape after the injury. Redhead had an attempt from outside the box but didn't quite catch it, and Fallows had to save again with

his feet as Sutton Coldfield kicked into gear in the middle of the second half.

They won the game thanks to two goals in four minutes. With Jack Downes on the deck at one end, the Royals exposed Sphinx at the other and Alex McSkeane shook off the attentions of the defence to smash the ball high beyond Fallows' grasp to make it 2-1.

In the 77th minute, a similar route proved fruitful once more. This time it was Ryan Edmunds who got in behind Sphinx on the left – rather more easily on this occasion – before bearing down on the goalkeeper and blasting his shot in off the near post. Fallows had no chance.

Sphinx made a couple of changes and found their feet. Brown saved from Parker after a smart save. Phillips smacked his effort over under determined pressure from a defender. The visitors were pushing but by the time the match ticked into stoppage time it was painfully obvious they weren't going to get any joy.



Sutton Coldfield capped a deserved win with a 95th-minute goal that looked, by now, far too familiar. Rhys Hilton had the easiest task of the three players who found space on Sphinx's left after Martin's withdrawal and had all the time in the world to pick his spot for 4-1. It was a poor goal to concede but one Hilton had earned with a fine performance.

The fourth goal was out of keeping with a match that was a little closer than it appeared but it can serve as an important reminder of exactly what Sphinx are up against as they hunt for their first win as a Step Four club.

Sutton Coldfield were ruthless in the second half, doubling their lead soon after getting their noses in front and then keeping the visitors largely at arm's length before the final stoppage time blow.

Martin's injury changed the mood but the equalising goal before the break changed the game.

The Royals showed their eighth tier nous to put Sphinx away in the second half, but the visitors were the better team for most of the first

Spalding United aside, Sphinx's challenging start to the season has been offset by their ability to stay in every game and find spells of supremacy.

They did the latter against Sutton Coldfield but not the former. Either way, as the season progresses they need to do more than stay close and look good. Wins must follow.

QUORN 4 COVENTRY SPHINX 0

Isuzu FA Trophy First Round Qualifying

Saturday 9th September 2023

Coventry Sphinx's first outing in the Isuzu FA Trophy was a short one. They were beaten 4-0 by league rivals Quorn at the first hurdle, exiting in First Round Qualifying on a scorching day in Leicestershire.

This loss will live long in the memory for all the wrong reasons, stark in its contrast from the consistent highs of 2022/23.

Sphinx should have had all three points against Quorn in the league less than a month before this Trophy defeat and the difference will be cause for concern for the management team.

Joint managers John Woodward and Shaun Thomas handed a debut to new signing Will Edjenguele, who played in defence with Louis Guest and Callum Whiteside in front of goalkeeper Keelan Fallows.

The wing back positions were taken by midfielder Jack Downes and winger Leigh Phillips. Luke Downes and Callum Woodward started in midfield behind Jac Redhead, with Dylan Parker and striker Matty Shipman more advanced.

Quorn handled the searing heat better throughout and had plenty of possession right out of the gate.

Sphinx felt their way into the match but had more of the ball than any meaningful territory before Fallows had to make a good save with his feet at the end of a dangerous counter-attack with quarter of an hour played.

At 0-0 this had the makings of a poor game in the heat. Two teams that wouldn't naturally do so were sitting off each other, eschewing the press in the name of energy preservation in the first quarter of the match.

The home team took the lead in the 25th minute. Quorn worked the ball in from their left and a pass across the box found Paddy Webb with plenty of time and space to tuck the ball past Fallows for 1-0. Sphinx were chasing a game they really didn't want to be chasing.

Now ahead, Quorn did what they needed to do and kept the ball moving around the Sphinx half for five minutes to take the sting out of any potential Sphinx response.

The visitors produced a lively move on the half hour, protecting the ball and passing with purpose.

Eventually it was clipped into the channel for Shipman, who showed good strength as he strode

into the box but could only hook the bouncing ball just over the crossbar.

That chance ushered in the most positive spell of the game for Sphinx. Parker cut a cross back to the edge of the box from the right flank and skipper Woodward met it with an ambitious header that had plenty of power but was saved and held by Ouorn goalkeeper Charlie Woods.

Sphinx improved in the latter part of the first half but were building primarily from Guest's patient quarterbacking out of defence, which made life relatively straightforward for his opposite numbers at the other end.



Quorn managed stoppage time well and saw themselves safely to half time. After the break the match quickly regained its previous shape and the contest was effectively killed off by Webb's second goal six minutes into the half.

Poor defending left the striker with a simple finish under Fallows and the chances of Sphinx scoring twice looked wafer-thin.

Woodward and Thomas turned to the bench, bringing the returning Kyle Carey on for Parker in the 54th minute, but the visitors were on the brink



of collapse one week on from a gutting second half at Sutton Coldfield Town in the league. Sure enough, sleepy defending and sharp play from the home team gave Quorn a 3-0 lead inside an hour.

They moved the ball quickly from back to front and Webb's clever flick around the corner sent Charlie Marzano clear in the right channel. His neat finish put the game to bed once and for all

Sphinx were playing for pride in the last twenty minutes and they didn't do much to achieve even that.

Fallows had to save again in the 71st minute and Webb missed a golden opportunity to complete a hat-trick – from a terrible Sphinx corner – before the Sphinx goalkeeper was called into action again ten minutes from time.

Substitute Max Johnson gave Woods some work to do at 3-0. His deflected 25-yarder forced a good save, and a central free kick from even further out was well struck and smartly saved. That was really all Sphinx had to shout about.

There was still time for Redhead and substitute Sam Ellis to have attempts on goal, for Whiteside to clear two Quorn shots off the line in the space of a minute, for Fallows to tip one over, and for a Guest own goal to cap a dreadful afternoon by making it 4-0.

Losing by four clear goals is always a horrible experience, especially when it fairly reflects the nature of the game. To do so against a fellow promoted side – albeit in cup action rather than the league – is chastening.

Sphinx's start to life at Step Four didn't yield the points the early performances warranted.

Since then, injuries have caught up with Thomas and Woodward's team and they are struggling to find a foothold.

There were several occasions last season when the team, including many of the players still with Sphinx now, were challenged to show their mettle. They passed test after test in pursuit of the positive goal of winning the league.

Now, they must do it again. The objective is different but the expectation is the same: give everything, get yourselves out of a hole and show us what you can do.



Luis Díaz finished brilliantly. After the Liverpool forward streaked clear at the Tottenham Hotspur Stadium, the Reds thought they had the lead until the assistant referee raised his flag.

In the Premier League that means a review by the video assistant referee (VAR) team, headed up in this case by Darren England. The check passed quickly. The on-field decision was confirmed. Play went on and Liverpool went on to be beaten 2-1 by Spurs and end the match with nine men.

England made a very bad mistake. According to the now customary statement after the fact from the Professional Game Match Officials Board (PGMOL), the VAR team cleared the check in the mistaken belief that the assistant referee in North London had allowed the goal.

As human error goes, it's a doozy. The check was short because Díaz was evidently onside and nobody thought to make sure the original decision had deemed him so. Nothing the officials, the PGMOL or the Premier League could have said in the aftermath would have eased Liverpool's sense of injustice.

The predictably disgusting and irresponsible online reaction notwithstanding, from some people who should know better and some dangerous idiots who make a living from riling up their fellow morons, the Reds were on the wrong end of a pretty appalling embarrassment of balls-ups.

Liverpool's disallowed goal came in the first half of the match and the outrage was thick in the London air long before half time. The repercussions were swift and the mistake pored over in minute detail. The remainder of the weekend was dominated by talk of lines, of black and white decisions, and of the fundamental inability of VAR to get remotely close to achieving its stated purposes.

It's long been held that VAR (I'll refer to VAR as "it", while recognising that "it" is largely human), while imperfect for subjective decisions, is at least infallible when it comes to objective, binary facts.

Goal-line technology has the ultimate football fact covered but has been shown to be far from flawless. VAR's yes or no situation, its black and white, is offside. It's considered clear enough that a degree of automation has been brought in to make decisions about it.

Semi-automatic offside-detecting robotics would have spared England's blushes at Spurs. His error wouldn't have been possible and there's no way the technology would have failed to distinguish onside from offside when it was, frankly, an easy call.

But automation of offside decisions under VAR merely furthers the great myth behind VAR, the lie behind the line: that offside is objective. It's not. It cannot be. Believe what you want but football doesn't have the technology to make a perfect true or false decision on

offside. It never will because there's no such thing as offside.

Football has become a sport of millimetres, far removed from the original intention behind the offside rule. The game is attempting to reduce offside to a line across a frame. In the game's futile quest for pure officiating, accepting the rank inadequacy of this solution is bizarre.

Offside is nebulous and cannot be satisfactorily handled by VAR. There's a margin of error that nobody speaks about anymore.

That doesn't tally with the microscopic policing of the magical mystery line. A margin of error once said – years ago, admittedly – to be as large as 30 centimetres warranted further scrutiny. Somehow, it's been dismissed as inconsequential.

We live under the tyranny of red and blue lines, each fatter than the slivers of reality they're supposed to patrol. To disallow goals by such ludicrously tiny margins is nonsense of the highest order.

An offside decision involves many pieces of information being processed all at once yet accuracy is demanded to the thousandth of a second even though the technology deployed is wholly incapable of keeping up.

When was the ball played? Is any part of the attacker in an offside position at that inaccurately defined moment? Can they use that part of their body to score?

The collective decision in world football is to conveniently pretend these information points don't matter with the same specificity as the almighty offside plane drawn at the arbitrary moment of truth.

If VAR is to adjudicate offside, either semi-automatically or by providing the materials for a corporeal official dressed in match gear for some reason, then it must reproduce the exact moment of offside with no margin of error at either end of the physical space involved, no temporal discrepancy whatsoever between the striking of the ball and the drawing of the line, and no grey area between body parts that can play the ball and those that can't.

VAR can't do that. VAR offside is a lie.

The alternative method of adjudication is a fleshy, fallible human assistant referee. The flaw in VAR isn't 30cm or an armpit or a toe or a split-second, but its ability to convince football that the offside line is a line when it's not.

VAR draws a digital line where only an imaginary line once stood. A tight offside is a judgement call as much

as a foul or a handball. It's as much art as science and no technology in existence can take in the essence of that crucial moment as well as an assistant referee.

Technology can't know when a ball is kicked like a person can. It's not as good as we are at seeing two things happening at once while ten other things happen in between, often in multiple and contradictory directions. Technology cannot, now or in the future, understand offside – really, truly understand it.

VAR's great unspoken truth is that no millimetre-thin offside call made with the aid of the technology will ever be right or wrong. Offside is there when we know, in our eyes and our brain and our experience and our gut, that it's there. VAR can't do the same because the line doesn't exist.

Ahead of its first use in a World Cup I was asked to write an article about VAR for *New Scientist* magazine. On that occasion my doomsaying was largely unfounded but I stand by my view that VAR is an attempt by football to achieve perfection it doesn't need, shouldn't want, and can never achieve.

By way of a conclusion, I wrote:

"Is the juice of marginal – and debatable – improvement worth the squeeze on football's unique character? For all its riches, all the infrastructure it commands, all the cultural value it offers, football is a game. Every once in a while we should remember how absurd it is that we take it so seriously. It's the best game in the world, but it's still a game. That's precisely why it's beautiful."

That was in the summer of 2018. There was a worthy rebuttal published by NBC News that placed more trust in the data, albeit FIFA data, that proved (loosely) an increase in accuracy of decision-making. Offside will have accounted for a great deal of that improvement and that, in my view, was problematic.

Regardless, VAR has one failing that matters above all others. Even when the decision is right, whatever that means, the process that gets us there is too damaging to the wonderful imperfection of what is, in the end, supposed to be sport – not to mention the way it compromises the joy of the only moment in the game that really matters.

It simply isn't worth it.

CORBY TOWN

The club was established in 1948, taking over from Stewarts & Lloyds as the main team in the town. The new team contained a mix of Stewarts & Lloyds and new players, and took over from Stewarts and Lloyds in the United Counties League. Their first league match saw them win 5–1 against Wellingborough Town.

They went on to win back-to-back league titles in 1950–51 and 1951–52, after which they joined the Midland League as it was expanded to 24 clubs, with the reserve team taking the club's place in the United Counties League.

Having signed sixteen new players, many of whom had played in the Football League, they went into the final match of the season on 1 May 1953 sitting level at the top of the table with Nottingham Forest reserves, who were the visitors to Corby for the final match.

In front of a crowd of 6,294, Corby lost the match and Forest reserves won the title by two points. In 1954–55 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time, losing 2–0 at home to Watford.

In 1958 Corby transferred to the Southern League, spending their first season in the North-Western Division, before being placed in Division One for the 1959–60 season. Despite only finishing sixth in 1961–62, Corby applied for election to the Football League. However, they failed to receive a single vote.

After finishing seventh the following season the club applied again, and again received no votes. In 1963–64

they reached the first round of the FA Cup for a second time, losing 3–1 at home to Bristol City. They appeared in the first round again the following season, losing 3–1 at home to Hartlepools United.

The season also saw them finish fourth in Division One, earning promotion to the Premier Division, as well as making another failed bid for Football League membership.

In 1965–66 Corby progressed beyond the first round of the FA Cup for the first time; after beating non-League Burton Albion 6–3 in the first round, they won 1–0 at Luton Town in a second round replay after the first match ended 2–2. In the third round they were beaten 6–0 at Plymouth Argyle.

The club applied for Football League membership for a fourth time, and for the first time received a single vote for their unsuccessful bid. The club made their final application in 1966–67, again receiving no votes.

The following season saw another FA Cup first round appearance (a 1–0 defeat at Boston United) but ended in relegation to Division One. In 1971 the club were placed in Division One North after league reorganisation.

Further reorganisation in 1979 and 1982 saw them placed in the Midland Division and then the Premier Division.

Corby remained in the Premier Division until being relegated at the end of the 1989–90 season, but made

an immediate return to the Premier Division after finishing as Division One Midlands runners-up in 1990-

After finishing bottom of the Premier Division in 1994–95, the club were relegated again. In 1998 they were moved to the Division One South, and then were placed in Division One East for the 1999–2000 season.

After being transferred to Division One West in 2004, they were moved back to Division One East the following season. In 2005–06 they finished second, and were promoted to the Premier Division.

The 2008–09 season saw Corby win the Premier Division, earning promotion to the Conference North.

In 2010–11 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time since the 1960s, losing 4–2 to Luton Town in a replay.

They appeared in the first round again the following season, losing 3–1 at Bristol Rovers.

After four seasons in the Conference North, Corby were relegated at the end of the 2012–13 season. They were Southern League Premier Division champions again in 2014–15 and were promoted back to the renamed National League North.

However, another relegation in 2015–16 saw the club relegated to the Premier Division of the Northern Premier League.

The club were transferred to Division One East of the Southern League at the end of the 2017–18 season as part of the restructuring of the non-League pyramid.

The following season saw the club transferred to Division One Central of the Southern League. At the end of the 2020–21 season they were transferred to Division One Midlands of the Northern Premier League.

GARY SETCHELL

Appointed manager in January 2023 having managed Bedford Town to promotion in 2021/22 before being sacked in November 2022. Gary previously managed his home town club Kings Lynn for a total of 384 matches and also had two spells in charge at Wisbech Town. During a lengthy playing career Gary appeared for Kings Lynn, Wisbech, Kettering Town, Rushden & Diamonds, Tamworth and AFC Sudbury.

DARREN EADY

Appointed assistant manager in January 2023. As a player Darren appeared for Peterborough United, Kings Lynn, Stamford, Spalding and St Neots. He has also worked with Gary Setchelll at Wisbech and Bedford.

BEN HEATH

A vastly experienced 28-year-old goalkeeper. Ben was a youth team player at Northampton Town before joining Daventry Town in July 2014. A year later he moved on to Rugby Town and in October 2016 signed for AFC Rushden & Diamonds. Ben went on to make over 100 appearances for Diamonds and the high spot of his four years there came in 2017/18 when he kept 22 clean sheets in 42 matches and conceded just 25 goals in all. In August 2021 he signed for St Ives Town and Gary Mills brought him to Corby Town in December 2021. Ben made his Steelmen debut against Stamford on New Years Day 2022 and went on to make a total of 17 appearances during the remainder of 2021/22. He ioined Stamford in the summer of 2022 and helped the Daniels win the divisional title in 2022/23 - also appearing for Cogenhoe United on a dual registration. Ben returned to Corby Town in July 2023.

KALERN THOMAS

Leicester-born defender Kalern had spells with Walsall. Birstall United and Quorn before joining Loughborough Dynamo. He made seven appearances for them early in 2013/14 before becoming one of the first signings made by new Corby Town joint managers Andrew Wilson and Tommy Wright in September 2013 when aged 21. Kalern made his debut as a substitute in a 3-3 F.A Cup draw away to Mickleover Sports and went on to become one of the biggest successes of the Steelmen's season. Most of his 43 appearances - which produced a single goal - were made at right back but he proved equally effective when asked to play at centre half towards the end of the season. Kalern was again a regular member of the first team in the number two shirt in 2014/15 when he made a further 43 appearances as the Steelmen were crowned Evo-Stik Southern League Premier Division champions. He made the step up to the Blue Square North with ease and scored twice in 41 games

at the higher level in 2015/16. As the championship winning squad began to break up Kalern moved on to Boston United in the summer of 2016 - after scoring three goals in a total of 127 appearances for the Steelmen – and played 34 times for them in 2016/17. He joined Solihull Moors in June 2017 but made only a handful of appearances for them before signing for Kettering Town in December 2017. He played 24 times for the Poppies during the remainder of 2017/18 before moving to Kings Lynn in June 2018. Kalern has spent the past three seasons with Coalville Town, making around eighty appearances, but in May 2022 signed for Ilkeston Town and then rejoined Corby Town early last season. Ne added two gloals at a further 33 Steelmen appearances. Off the field Kalern is a personal trainer at Leicester Fitness and Well Being Gym.

MICHAEL IACKLIN

'laffa' began his career with Grimsby Town and also had a spell playing in the USA early in his career. He then played for Brigg Town and Bridlington Town before signing for Harrogate Town in August 2010. Next stop for Michael was Grantham Town and he then spent the 2012/13 season with Stamford. In May 2013 he returned to Brigg Town and in 2014 joined Lincoln United. In February 2017 he signed for Gainsborough Trinity and then had a second spell with Lincoln United. He joined Cleethorpes Town for the 2020/21 season and in June 2021 he signed for Loughborough Dynamo. A no-nonsense centre half. Michael arrived at Steel Park in July 2022 and was immediately installed as club captain. He was a regular member of the side throughout the season and scored 6 goals in 41 appearances.

DANIEL JAMES GORDON

A versatile left sided player equally at home as an orthodox full back, a wing back or as an attacking wide player. Danny started out at Heather St Johns FC and moved to Carlton Town in 2015/16. In January 2018 he joined Loughborough Dynamo and spent four years there before arriving at Corby Town in July 2022. Danny has previously played against the Steelmen for Carlton and Loughborough. His long throw ins are a big feature of his play and he picked up two Player of the Year awards last season as he finished as top scorer with 11 goals in 40 appearances.

CALLUM MILNE

Central defender signed on dual registration with St Ives Town in January 2023. As a youngster Callum spent six years on the books of Aston Villa and has also played for Kettering Town, Wisbech Town, Eynesbury Rovers, Bedford Town and Harborough Town. Last season he scored 1 goal in 9 appearances.

TRISTAN THOMPSON-MATTHEWS

A hard working and skilful midfield player, Tristan joined Loughborough Dynamo from Heanor Town in the summer of 2020. He scored on his debut against Lutterworth in an F.A Cup tie and made twelve appearances before the 2020/21 season was curtailed by the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2021/22 his four goals in 38 appearances included a hat-trick TOBY HILLIARD in a 6-1 victory over Yaxley. Tristan signed for Corby Town in July 2022 and scored 8 goals in 42 appearances in 2022/23.

MATTHEW SLINN

Son of former Steelman Kevin Slinn. A former Northampton Town Academy player, Matty appeared in midfield for the Cobblers' Under-18 side. Upon his release from Sixfields he joined AFC Rushden & Diamonds in the summer of 2019 and he scored twice in 43 competitive appearances before leaving to join Corby Town in July 2022. He missed a large part of last season with injury but made 18 appearances and was named Managers Player of the Year.

HILTON ARTHUR

Hilton had youth spells at Boreham Wood and Hemel Hempstead alongside Sidik Atcha but the two teenagers initially came to prominence as Corby Town's successful under-eighteen vouth team in 2017/18. Hilton made substitute appearances in pre-season friendlies against Wellingborough Town and Grantham Town at the start of the following campaign and was given his competitive first team debut - again as a substitute - in a 3-2 Southern League Cup defeat at home to Peterborough Sports in September 2018. Hilton made a further three appearances and after leaving Corby had a spell with Burton Park Wanderers before joining Soham Town Rangers in January 2022. After a spell training here at Steel Park he rejoined the Steelmen early last season and scored 8 goals in 30 appearances.

IORDAN O'BRIEN

An attacking player who had a spell with Leicester City before initially joining Corby Town in 2017. He scored 2 goals in 18 appearances in 2017/18 before being signed for s fee by Sheffield Wednesday. During his time there Jordan helped Town during the Steelmen's pre-season programme in 2017. Wednesday win two Under-18 titles and also appeared in the He joined Corby after being released by Kings Lynn and then club's Under-23 side. He returned to Steel Park in 2020 and made 6 appearances in the Covid-19 affected 2020/21 season. In 2021/22 Jordan was top scorer with 12 goals in 40 appearances and last season he netted 8 times in 18 appearances during an injury and illness hit campaign.

CHARLEY SANDERS

A powerful player equally at home in defence or attack. He graduated through the ranks at Boston United from the club's Centre of Excellence through the youth and rserve

team's to make his first team debut in 2012/13. After leaving Boston he played for Kings Lynn, Histon, Spalding, Huntingdon, Grantham, Yaxley and Bedford Town, where he was captain. Charley signed for Corby Town in March 2023 but was injured in just his second appearance.

A striker previously with Kings Lynn Town, Dereham Town, Wisbech Town and Spalding United. Toby signed for Corby Town in February 2023 and scored 4 goals in 10 appearances during the remainder of 2022/23.

DREW RICHARDSON

Midfield player Drew joined the Luton Town Academy at the age of 8 In December 2018 he had a spell on work experience with Harlow Town and following his release from Luton in May 2019 he signed for Biggleswade Town. In 2020 He moved to Bedford Town and made around 100 appearances for the Eagles and was a regular member of the promotion winning side under Gar Setchell. He ended 2022/23 with Stotfold and joined Corby Town in June 2023.

IACK KEEBLE

Defender lack began his football career with his local side Holbeach United as a 6-year-old. He was then taken on by Grimsby Town and captained their reserve side in 2017/18, He was named among the substitutes for the opening two games of that season but never made a senior appearance. Following his release from Grimsby Jack played for Wisbech Town, Stamford, Deeping Rangers and Holbeach United before Gar Setchell signed him for Bedford Town. In June 2023 he was re-united with Setchell at Corby Town.

IOE BUTTERWORTH

Son of former Peterborough United, Rushden & Diamonds and Stamford player Gary Butterworth, Central midfield player loe has also played for Stamford as well as Yaxley and Bedford Town. He joined Corby Town in July 2023.

DANNY SETCHELL

Son of manager Gary. Danny had a brief spell with Corby played for Wisbech St Mary, Wisbech Town, Stamford and Bedford Town. He signed for Corby Town in July 2023.
