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Upcoming fixtures



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It feels like more than a couple of weeks since we were here watching Coventry Sphinx's goalless draw with Coleshill Town. What promised to be a busy period has proved otherwise, at least in terms of fixtures, but the boys have been working hard to prepare for November's matches.

The first of those will take place today and it has a little added spice. The two teams were promoted into the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands as champions of their respective divisions in the United Counties League last season.

In that sense, today's fixture against Anstey Nomads is another yardstick for Sphinx as we continue to navigate this new adventure.

But today's visitors represent a formidable challenge in their own right. They kick off this fixture in third place in the league table. Week by week, we're learning more about just what an achievement that is.

After ten matches, the Nomads are also the only unbeaten team in the division. Their six wins have been eye-catching to say the least, and they certainly won't be taken lightly in this meeting of promoted sides.

Under John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, this team has built its success on punching up. That's the name of the game for 2023/24 too, and this afternoon's test is no different regardless of our shared progress up to this point.

The thinning out of October's schedule has had the inevitable effect on November and we have some rearranged fixtures ahead of us.

After this game against Anstey Nomads we'll be off to Walsall Wood next Saturday before the autumn

goes into football overdrive. On Tuesday 14th November we begin our Birmingham Senior Cup campaign with a second round clash against Nuneaton Borough. We were drawn away but where that match actually takes place is anyone's guess at this point.

The following Saturday brings another recent Step Five opponent to Sphinx Drive. We finished a couple of places behind Hinckley LR in their promotion season and they've settled nicely at this level in the season and a bit since.

On Tuesday 21st November we'll be away at Harborough Town for the rearranged match originally planned for the end of October.

We then close out the month at Boldmere St Michaels, so a couple of artificial pitches should keep us occupied as December draws closer. Weather permitting, November will be a breathless month and, potentially, a pivotal one.

It's in spells like this that the boys in sky blue and white have regularly stood up to be counted since football emerged from lockdown. If this club has a philosophy it's to go out there and earn the right to play, and then to play our way.

They've nailed that and they've proved themselves time and again. By the time we face current leaders Loughborough Dynamo at the start of December we'll know a lot more about the shape of the remainder of the season.

Welcome to the supporters, players, management and officials of Anstey Nomads to Sphinx Drive this afternoon.

I'm expecting an entertaining match and hopeful of a good start to the month. Come on you blue boys!

OURAS HISTORY

The history of Coventry Sphinx began in 1946. Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft FC had been highly successful in the city before and during the Second World War and changed their name to Sphinx FC.

AWA's legacy was replicated by the new club. Sphinx won a number of league and cup competitions throughout the 1950s and 1960s before playing a major role in the formation of the Coventry Alliance and continuing to win trophies in the following decades.

Coventry underwent significant socioeconomic change in the 1990s. The recession led to the closure of factories in the city and surrounding areas, which in turn led to the dissolution of many of Coventry's football clubs. Sphinx needed a new challenge and joined the Midland Combination Football League in 1993.

In our first season in the Midland Combination we were promoted from Division 2 and reached the semi-finals of the Birmingham Sunday Vase. A second consecutive promotion followed thanks to a second-placed finish in Division 1 the next season.

With promotion to the top division of the Midland Combination secured it was decided that the club should be linked more closely to our city. We became Coventry Sphinx and the first match under our new name was against a Coventry City XI at our home ground.

Throughout its history, our club has been served by countless loyal and hard-working local people who've contributed enormously to Coventry Sphinx on and off the field. Through their dedication we have achieved some unbeatable highs. There have also been times of great tragedy.

In November 2001, Sphinx manager Willie Knibbs was killed in a car accident on the way home from a cup match at Meir KA. Willie was a former Sphinx player in his second spell as manager. His death was a terrible loss to our club and to local football in Coventry.

After a painful season, Sphinx went on to win the Midland Combination Challenge Cup and it was renamed the Willie Knibbs Cup as a mark of respect. Our main stand is also named in Willie's honour.

Sphinx became one of the leading teams in the Midland Combination Premier League, finishing as runners-up in our first season and again in both 2005 and 2006. We reached the final of the Endsleigh Challenge Cup on three occasions, losing to Alveston at Villa Park in 1999 but beating Coventry Marconi in 2003 and Feckenham in 2005.

We also won the Coventry Evening Telegraph Cup in successive seasons, making Sphinx the last winners of the competition at Highfield Road and the first at the Ricoh Arena.

Although first team success is a driving force, the heartbeat of our club is the thriving junior section. Formed in 1997, it started with just three teams and has grown ever since. There are now hundreds of players representing Coventry Sphinx and we were the first club in Coventry to achieve the FA Charter.

Our youth team started competing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League in 2003 and one of the

biggest successes to date came in the 2014/15 season, when they won the double after suffering only one league defeat and beating Stourbridge 3-0 in the Birmingham County FA Midweek Floodlit Youth Cup.

Under manager Paul Charnley, Coventry Sphinx's men's first team completed a remarkable treble achievement in May 2007.

In addition to finally becoming champions of the Midland Football Combination – achieving promotion to the Midland Football Alliance in the process – Sphinx won the Coventry Charity Cup and the BCFA Midland Floodlit Cup.

The 2007/08 season saw Sphinx enjoy our best ever run in the FA Vase, reaching the quarter-final for the very first time and losing controversially to Kirkham & Wesham, the eventual Wembley winners, in a replay at Sphinx Drive.

We made a run to the semi-finals of the League Cup in the same season and went on to win the Midland Alliance Polymac League Cup by beating Westfields in the final in 2009/10.

In 2014/15 the club was honoured to become a founder member of the Midland Football League Premier Division. After a top ten finish under Stuart Dutton, Lee Knibbs took over as manager in the autumn of 2017.

Lee is the son of Willie Knibbs and returned to the club after an earlier spell as assistant manager to Danny McSheffrey.

He guided Sphinx to some of our most memorable results of the decade before deciding to step aside in November 2019.

Knibbs was succeeded by his assistants, John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, who became the club's joint managers and ended the truncated 2019/20 season on a long unbeaten run, the foundation of Sphinx's greatest achievement to come.

Sphinx made a sideways move as part of FA restructuring ahead of the 2021/22 season, competing in a newly formed Premier Division South in the United Counties League.

In our first season we finished in fourth place, losing only twice in the second half of the season, and enjoyed a long run in the FA Vase, narrowly missing out on another quarter-final.

The following season saw Sphinx lose on penalties again in the same round of the FA Vase but 2022/23 was the best season in our history.

In the space of one week in April, our club acquired the freehold to the Sphinx Drive ground for the very first time and secured the United Counties League Premier Division South title with a 7-0 win against Eynesbury Rovers.

Sphinx won all of the last eleven league matches to close a big gap at the top and become champions. We scored 106 goals and ended the season three points clear of runners-up Rugby Town to confirm promotion to the Northern Premier League Midlands Division. 2023/24 is our first ever season at Step 4.

Football never stands still. Local football in Coventry has declined over the years, so to be playing at our highest ever level after more than seventy years is an achievement of which the players, officials and supporters of our club can be proud.

The structure in place at senior, youth and junior levels for both men and women promises a bright future for Coventry Sphinx as we work towards the progress Willie Knibbs' memory deserves.

After signing the club's first ever contracted player, cross. In the fourth, Downes' clean strike was chairman Dannie Cahill reiterated Coventry Sphinx's intention to be competitive in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands.

Early draws in the 2023/24 season gave way to a difficult spell but wins over AFC Rushden & Diamonds and Rugby Town offered hope, A 2-2 draw at Shepshed Dynamo on a sunny October afternoon demonstrated again that Shaun Thomas and John Woodward's side have the ability to make their presence felt at Step Four.

On another day this match might have been won or lost. Both teams hit the frame of the goal in the second half. Sphinx deservedly led twice but had to hold on to a point as Shepshed rallied late. It was, in the end, an entertaining contest between two good teams - contrary to the loudly expressed view of a home supporter that the opposite had been true.

Sphinx came to play and made a good start at the Dovecote Stadium. Parker was next to go close, firing wide on the half-volley after a determined header by Shorrock to keep the move alive.

A Shepshed free kick from just outside the box was deflected wide immediately before Sphinx opened the scoring in the 20th minute. Goalkeeper Fallows sent a long kick forward looking for Lock, with Parker making the run in behind.

Lock didn't appear to get a touch but the bounce did the job and Parker smartly turned the ball past Ganley and into the Shepshed net for a lead the visitors deserved to cap off a fine first quarter of the match.

Dynamo were sparked into life by the need to chase the game. While Sphinx continued to look the better side for much of the first half, the hosts began to create openings.

Pearson Mwanyongo showed good composure to give himself a shooting chance that he took well but couldn't guide on target. With half an hour played, Fallows had to make a brilliant low save to keep out another deflected effort.

But Shepshed's pressure was building and they equalised in the 38th minute. There was a touch of good fortune about the cross from the right as it took a nick on the way to lames Shaw but the striker did well to finish off-balance at the near post.

Sphinx hadn't been able to hold out until half time but felt they could get themselves back in front in the second half.

They didn't take long to do so. Woodward and Thomas made a substitution at half time, with Bryson carrying a yellow card and a change of shape deemed necessary. Max Johnson came into midfield and it was a fruitful shift.

In the third minute of the half Parker rolled his man and got in behind again. This time he was fouled by Elwalid Elhaghany just inside the box and a penalty was awarded.

Injured skipper Callum Woodward took Sphinx's previous penalty so striker Shipman took responsibility for the spot kick and drilled home it to Ganley's bottom right while the goalkeeper headed in the opposite direction.

Sphinx remained on top into the middle of the second period. With his team in front and in the ascendancy, Shipman found himself on the end of a set of studs to the ribs. For the second match in a row, a Sphinx player was subjected to a clear instance of serious foul play and not a red card between them.

Shipman was subsequently shown a bizarre yellow card but the energetic visitors continued to push for a third goal. They thought they had it when Whiteside met a corner at the back post.

His header struck the inside of the post and somehow stayed out. Ganley had to react quickly to prevent it from spinning over the line and it was the closest Sphinx would get to another goal.



Dynamo's Kieran Cummings served notice as the home team cranked into action in search of a second equaliser. His powerful strike sailed over Fallows' goal with 20 minutes remaining but Shepshed's second was imminent.

Unfortunately it was a disappointing goal to concede from a Sphinx point of view. Substitute Dylan Reason headed in from a poorly defended corner to make it 2-2 and the home team now had the momentum.

Fallows had to tip over from a crossed free kick that would have snuck in the top corner with guarter of an hour left. Jack Downes, the captain for the second half, had to head an effort off the line from the resulting corner.

Sphinx had their moments. Lock was unlucky not to get a telling touch on a vicious ball across the box, and Shipman managed to dig out a speculative curling shot that was turned wide of goal for a corner. But Dynamo had the better of the final few minutes.

Fallows had to tip over once more with ten minutes left. shortly before another cross looked to be a threat only to swing just over the crossbar. In the second minute of stoppage time the home team came close to a spectacular winner.

The Sphinx goalkeeper cleared the ball into midfield and the quick-thinking Shaquille Master's chip was almost perfect. On this occasion it was the away team who were thankful for the intervention of the woodwork.

Sphinx returned to Coventry with one point that might have been three. Drawing after twice going in front is cause for frustration but the effort and application of the players – not to mention the quality on show - rightly earned them applause at the end of a terrific match.

Shepshed are now an established Step Four outfit and Sphinx went toe to toe with them, matching them for the most part and bettering them for spells too. It was an encouraging display and one that can give the team confidence as they move towards the last game of October.

OF THE AGE OF SPORTSMANSHIP

Somewhere in the sociohistorical development of English football there was a change that had implications that reached right into the cardiac chambers of the sport.

Football as we know it was originally a construct of Victorian England, an era in which the Industrial Revolution, an increase in leisure time and the establishment of public schools collided to shape the sporting spirit into which organised football was born.

As the game evolved in the second half of the nineteenth century, amateurism and gentlemanliness were more than incidental to football. They were values; football was a game and games were to be played.

The Victorian gentleman might have been competitive but he also considered himself refined and dignified.

Fair play was paramount and even the idea of professionalism was contemptible. Playing to win was one thing. Paying to win was quite another. Chicanery, while not absent, was beyond the pale.

These values, early English football's corinthian spirit, became so thoroughly baked into the social understanding of the game that they withstood the dawn of professionalism and football's significant shift up the country and down the social classes. Even today, the very notion of sport is coloured by their residue.

It's easy to imagine the early days of organised football in grainy sepia, respectful teams of well-todo gentlemen in stockings and heavy jerseys steadfastly observing the rules they were still in the process of engineering.

The first couple of decades of FA Cup finals alone were full of tales of sportsmanship even as the centre of power moved northward. But there was vexation aplenty too.

Nevertheless, there's no denying that football's essence has changed in the last century and a half. Darwen, one of the north-western clubs to make a significant impact on the FA Cup in what can be considered its second act, were probably the first in England to pay a player.

Football is a highly professionalised business nowadays – lucrative, too, and therein lies the likely root of the matter.

A hundred years of money-making either through or with competitive young men inevitably brought us to where we are today and, honestly, the game is better for it. There's no need for rose-tinted spectacles, here: football in the commercial age has been a cultural creation *par excellence*.

But have we pushed it too far? Even in the Premier League area we've seen the elite footballer's unwavering and indeed admirable thirst for victory go into overdrive.

That intensity is necessary for the preservation of the modern game's vitality but it's also the core of a lot of its criticism.

The ever shrinking vocabulary of football's online hard-of-thinking absorbs, misappropriates and destroys cultural language from outside itself. Everyone's a 'starboy', now. 'GOAT' has outgrown its immediately tedious Twitter phase and leaked into television advertising for dad-dancing brands apparently content to be ripped off by their creative agencies from the inside of the arsehole out.

But 'shithousery' is irritating and reductive guff all of football's own making. Overused though it is, the phenomenon it describes is very real and almost completely accepted. We are in the age of win-at-allcosts cheating. That sounds like a complaint; it's not. The extreme competition, purified professionalism and global commercialism of football makes it unavoidable.

It's a simple fact that cheating is everywhere in toplevel football. Diving is much more prevalent than it was (I was actually told there was academic research that backed this up but, after a cursory search, I couldn't find it) and time-wasting has been one of football's most popular talking points since the most recent World Cup.

The same mentality – along with financial ambition and other, more nefarious goals – is also behind the boardroom developments of the last twenty years. The game is awash with dirty money and the machinations and manipulations of ownership groups, state or not, are worthy of note too.

That we allow clubs to be adopted as the inferior sibling in international stables is extraordinary, when you think about it. It's not cheating but it's definitely up at the snide end of the spectrum. There's nothing corinthian about Red Bull.

In my experience all of this is broadly seen as acceptable by the majority of supporters. After all, not everybody is a middle-aged man offering his old -fashioned opinions on the internet. The divers and the state-owned clubs are just playing the game, aren't they?

I'd love to know why football collectively shrugs its shoulders on this matter, as if its commercial imperative necessarily erodes its sporting origins.

I don't have anything approaching an answer to that. I just find it interesting, and in the part of my brain where that happens is a frustrated sociologist more inclined to turn his gaze to the fans.

It's important to distinguish between normal, functioning human beings who like football and the maniacs who spoil it online for the rest of us. There are big problems in the real world. The behaviour of men in crowds has deteriorated. Lockdown, drugs and hardship are all anecdotally linked to increases in violence and antisocial offences at football.

But an extreme anti-sporting attitude – the cultish zealotry with which football fanatics on social media defend and advocate for everything their clubs say and do – is a problem that starts online and, really, mostly stays there.

Battle lines are drawn in blood. Not an inch of ground is to be conceded. No matter is to be considered closed.

This is toxic digital extremism in our football culture, the farthest possible point from amateurs admitting to handball and congratulating one another on a game well played.

It doesn't necessarily ooze out into the stands but it has reached the click-hungry media and tainted the overall football discourse. It's a vicious cycle and it's erected a barbed wire fence around each of our clubs.

It's not so much a case of us versus them, but us versus them and them and them and them and everyone else too. No wonder we approve of a bit of diving.

Sportsmanship is dominated in modern football by the will to win, its eternal foe. But it's still out there, on the pitch, in the form of camaraderie and even outright examples of fair play.

It still exists, still matters, and even though we generally accept that there's a game within the game, sportsmanship is worth preserving.

Football rightly has no desire to return to amateurism or corinthian principles but fair play, respect, integrity and collective supporter action should be valued. Without them, football really will fall into the hands of those who deserve it least.

COVENTRY SPHINX COLESHILL TOWN

Pitching In NPL **Division One Midlands** Saturday 21st October 2023

Most of the drama relating to Coventry Sphinx's home fixture against Coleshill Town happened before the match. Coleshill lined up with Paul Hathaway in the dugout after the swift exit of new manager Dave Stringer in the week.



Sphinx, meanwhile, were able to welcome a new signing into the team in the form of the versatile Gio Dainty, who returned to Sphinx Drive after his own - rather longer - spell at Pack Meadow. He made his debut from the start against his old team -mates.

The match itself was an absorbing but ultimately uneventful and goalless one, leaving the teams to split the points in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands table.

Dainty was joined in the starting eleven by goalkeeper Keelan Fallows and a defence consisting of Joe Pursey, captain Louis Guest, Will Edjenguele and Finlay Shorrock. Jack Downes and Luke Downes started in midfield with Alex Lock and the line-up was completed by forwards Dylan Parker and Matty Shipman.

From frantic beginnings, the game briefly settled into a pattern of Coleshill possession in the middle of the pitch before an injury to former Sphinx player Alex Tomkinson delayed the first half. His replacement, Adrian Gyamera, has also spent time at Sphinx Drive. Coleshill went wide with an effort in the 20th minute and soon began to control the game.

In the 20th minute Sphinx stopper Fallows made the only real save of the match and it was an

excellent one. Niall Rowe's header from a Coleshill corner appeared destined for the net but a strong hand from the diving goalkeeper denied him.

Just as it became clear the home team needed to find their feet they managed to put together a spell of pressure at the other end.

Striker Shipman outpaced his marker wide on the Sphinx right and whipped a tremendous ball across the box for Parker, who was smartly levered off balance in front of goal.

The visitors were next to get a glimpse of goal but the shot was driven over. With half an hour played Parker had a shot blocked for the hosts.

A scramble followed in the Coleshill box but the ball never quite dropped for a player in a Sphinx shirt.

Sphinx were the better team for a period in the first half and looked dangerous, getting in behind and starting to make things happen. The chance they wanted remained elusive and the Colemen came back into the match.



But it was the home team who had the final opportunity of a slightly stodgy first half. Shipman and Lock cleverly exchanged passes but the midfield man could only fire over Lewis Landers' crossbar.

The match opened up a little after the break. Fallows made a simple save from Oscar Tonge after he'd been teed up by Ashton Demulder in the 50th minute and the chance that really should have won the game came Coleshill's way just before the hour.

Lewis Archer capitalised on a defensive slip with the visitors on the break and chose to try and sneak the ball in at the near post instead of going across Fallows with only the goalkeeper to beat. He missed the target and that opening was really the only difference between the sides in this goalless encounter.

Debutant Dainty went over from the edge of the box after a nice tee-up from Guest with his back to goal. Fallows then had to move his feet and get a good hand to the ball to tip over an in-swinging corner but Sphinx were in the ascendancy. Again, they couldn't generate a proper look at goal.



Some sloppy play and a Sphinx giveaway led to another Coleshill effort that went over the bar, and with guarter of an hour remaining a Shorrock free kick met the same fate with Landers unconcerned.

Parker then dug out a lovely cross from the right but Dainty's header under pressure at the back post came to nothing. Despite the late urgency in the game largely coming from the home team, Archer had another chance in the 79th minute and dragged it wide again.

Shipman popped up with two attempts on target late in the day. With two minutes left in regulation time his header from a corner had to be sliced off the Coleshill goal line by Gyamera, and in stoppage time he was slipped in on the right and saw his shot held by Landers.

Thanks to Harborough Town's progress in the FA Trophy there will be a two-week break for Sphinx after the draw with the Colemen, after which Thomas and Woodward's side will be back in league action at home against Anstey Nomads.

Nomads won the United Counties League Premier Division North while Sphinx won the Premier Division South last season, so it'll be another informative test for the boys in sky blue and white.


Steadily picking up points through the winter will go a long way to helping Sphinx meet their objectives for the season and a

SPHINX MAN OF THE MATCH LOUIS GUEST



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In February 2021, two North American celebrities completed a deal to purchase a National League football club in North Wales. They promised – in deed if not word – a media circus. In the fifth tier of English football there is a cynicism about bold commitments and ambitious statements of intent. With few exceptions, these are clubs that have been burned before.

The National League, formerly the Football Conference, is in my football blind spot. It's at once too low down and too high up for my tastes, essentially equidistant between the easy access of the Premier League (in which the team I grew up supporting play) and the eighth and ninth levels where I actually experience the sport in person.

Level five, or Step One to me, is of little to no consequence. Apart from enjoying the odd game on television, the National League is so far out of my sphere of experience that I'm wholly unable to raise an opinion even on the matter of how many promotion places the division offers into the EFL – one of the hot button issues in non-league football.

In short, and in the nicest possible way, I don't much care. I wish its participants well and I want them to be solvent and healthy. I hope their supporters get the same joy from the game as I do. But turn the table upside down in the middle of the season and it's a toss-up as to whether I'd notice.

So, when Rob McElhenney and Ryan Reynolds bought Wrexham, their takeover initially inspired the usual scepticism that comes into my mind when ailing clubs are rescued by knights in shining armour and never more so than when I've heard of them. I'm not Against Modern Football in any meaningful sense but I am in many ways a traditionalist and a little old-fashioned when it comes to my football values. Celebrity, documentaries and clubs spending beyond their previously sustainable means always ring alarm bells.

Yet I've found myself gradually coming around to Ronald McDonald and Van Wilder's ownership of Wrexham. What makes this takeover different from others that have left a sour taste?

The first thing that should be acknowledged is that I already liked McElhenney and Reynolds. That's not true of all football club owners and it certainly isn't true of all celebrity club owners, most of whom are plastic, vacuous tosspots who have no idea what they're doing and no intention of finding out.

So, there's some bias here. Between *It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia* and its associated podcast I spend more virtual time than is strictly advisable in McElhenney's company. I'm a fan of McElhenney, of the show, of Charlie Day and Glenn Howerton, of Kaitlin Olson and Danny DeVito. I've always found Reynolds funny.

That's not a reason to support their ownership of a lower league football club but damned if it doesn't buy them a longer leash when it comes to my own cynicism. It would be poor form not to admit that. The upshot is that I believe them, albeit while reserving the right to pull that sentiment at a moment's notice. I'm not in favour of everything they've done and said at Wrexham but if we're asking whether they're a positive for Wrexham in terms of the bigger picture, I'm sold. It helps that I'm late to the party. I'm interested in nonleague football and Wrexham have been one of the biggest stories, so I've observed from afar. But it's only relatively recently that my wife and I have rattled through the documentary.

Wrexham are now in the fourth tier. The pudding's already been eaten and the proof must have been pretty special. The new Wrexham had already achieved big things before I sat down to watch the first episode of *Welcome to Wrexham* and that sure makes it easier to trust that the owners have good intentions and the smarts to bring them to fruition.

The documentary reveals a pair of owners who know what they don't know but care a whole hell of a lot. When they're wealthy enough to make an impact, that really is the key difference. *Welcome to Wrexham* is good television, raw and apparently honest, and its greatest attribute is its focus on the learning curve of owners who are aware that they have lots to learn.

It's not all sunshine and light in North Wales. The documentary has clearly been made with an American audience in mind and therefore occasionally chafes for those of us who absorbed the basics of football the better part of four decades ago.

There are some people who appear regularly in *Welcome to Wrexham* with whom I would actively avoid going for a pint. Out of respect for the fact they are members of the public, I shan't delve any further. There are a number of instances of what I believe to be performative passion – inauthentic "I'm so bloody Wrexham, me!" showing off that simply doesn't ring true.

But there's also Paul Mullin. The now globally famous Liverpudlian striker is, by every measure I can dream up, a good egg. Like McElhenney and Reynolds, I find Mullin natural, engaging and easy to root for.

Then we come to Shaun Harvey, whose prolific presence in *Welcome to Wrexham* seems to suggest that his official role as advisor to the board undersells his influence at the Racecourse Ground. Harvey is the documentary's puzzle. He obviously comes across well – that's how it works – but the level of access McElhenney and Reynolds appear to be serving up does give Harvey the space to reveal himself as an informed and capable administrator especially suited to leading the club in lieu of any actual expertise elsewhere at board level.

But...well, it's Shaun Harvey. The worldwide audience of *Welcome to Wrexham* will have no idea about his career up to this point but it shouldn't be overlooked. , Harvey became one of English football's most powerful officials when he was voted in as the Chief Executive of The Football League, which operates and represents the second, third and fourth tiers of the English game.

In his time in charge of The Football League, which unfortunately became the EFL by way of a rebrand under his watch, Harvey was neither popular nor respected. He was instrumental in the introduction of the dastardly EFL Trophy and oversaw the completion of a television rights deal that wasn't well received by the league's 72 clubs. The manner in which the deal was done was also criticised.

Harvey's involvement with Wrexham is presumably under the guise of Wantaway Limited, the consultancy firm of which he shares directorship with his wife, Nicola, and has other clients that include the always delightful folk at FIFA. *Welcome to Wrexham* looks good on him, though, and as well it might. McElhenney and Reynolds have brought a lot to the Racecourse but success on the pitch wouldn't happen without the knowledge of Harvey and the ability of manager Phil Parkinson.

Clearly, Parkinson has also had some outrageously superior raw materials with which to work. Currently turning out alongside Mullin and Ollie Palmer, the big signings lauded by the documentary thus far, is Steven Fletcher. The Scottish striker has played for three different clubs in the Premier League and two in the Scottish Premiership, not to mention a loan spell at Marseille and 39 international caps.

Therein resides the reason I shouldn't be as amenable as I am to the Wrexham project. Mullin and Palmer should have been out of reach for a National League team. Fletcher should have been out of reach for an EFL League Two team. That they weren't is proof positive that McElhenney and Reynolds have tilted the playing field. That, to me, tends to be a major problem. Even in this case I find it a little difficult to stomach.

But there's nothing inherently wrong with investing one's money in a football club within the parameters of the rules and my issue with outwardly ambitious ownership always really comes down to whether they're breaking the rules and whether their very involvement puts their clubs at risk when they're supposed to be custodians.

That's the crucial difference with *Welcome to Wrexham*. Call me overly generous and gullible and naive, accuse me of being redwashed by Hollywood, but I look at Wrexham from a distance and the one thing above all that I don't see is undue risk from their ownership.

For all the sideshow glitz and star power, McElhenney and Reynolds seem to be a force for good in North Wales and at Wrexham because they put the club before their celebrity but use their celebrity for the betterment of the club.

A cynical old fool I may be, but I wouldn't be much of a football supporter if I begrudged the Wrexham fans that. We all need to soak up and enjoy the good times. Wrexham have had many during their long history.

They might just be on the cusp of the best of all.

Before the Second World War two clubs, the St Mary's and the Prims, were playing in Anstey.

It was after the war when the boys returned from the services, that the two clubs, Marys and the PM decided to join forces under the name of Anstey Meths and Mary's, which formed in 1946. However after one season it was decided that the name of the club would be changed to Anstey Nomads.

With the formation of the Nomads football in Anstey took on a higher status, for Leicestershire Senior League Football – the highest grade of amateur football in the county – came to the village.

Early successes in winning the Senior League Division 1 (1951-52 and 1953-54) were followed by heady exploits in the FA Amateur Cup. In their first attempt they reached the first round proper losing 2-1 at Cambridge.

In the second season Gedling Colliery knocked them out in the final qualifying round 2-1 a Gedling. The following season the club wrote a new page in Leicestershire amateur football history, after playing through all five preliminary rounds, their big day arrived when 400 supporters hired a train and made the journey to Gray's in Essex to see the team win 3-1 in the 1st round proper. The 2nd round saw a crowd of 4,500 at Cropston Road with the Nomads losing 2-1 to Hayes.

The club then joined the Central Alliance with little or no success. The revamping of Midlands football saw the club in the East Midlands Regional League in 1966-67

and of the six years spent there, top four places were gained in three of them.

Back in the Leicestershire Senior League in 1973 and after winning Division Two in their first season the Nomads became one of the powerhouses of local football mainly under the guidance of John Perkins, Willie Wilcox and Denis Moran.

In the nineties history was created when the Leicestershire Senior Cup and Junior Cup "the double" was achieved in 1994-95. Into the Noughties and 2008-09 was the Nomads most successful season for many a day.

Champions of the Leicestershire Senior League and winners of a host of local cups under Stu Deeley. Also gaining promotion to the East Midlands Counties League. And apart from one season steady progress has been made with u/21 and u/18 teams flirted with.

Promoted to the United Counties league, new dressing rooms and a ground overhaul, season 2021/22, with first team, under 21's, 3 x under 18's, women's senior team and a further 34 junior teams together with a walking football side.

Further promotion has put on step 4 playing in the Northern Premier League Midlands Division 1.

In addition to the first team we now have 57 teams playing under the Nomads banner including Women, Under 18's and Junior sides. The Football Foundation is the Premier League, The FA and the Government's charity.
