Welcome to the Sphinx Industrial Supplies Arena for this afternoon's Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands match between Coventry Sphinx and Shepshed Dynamo.

I'd like to begin by extending our condolences to our visitors on behalf of everyone at the Sphinx before the funeral of Pete Bull next week. Nonleague clubs can't exist without people like Pete and our thoughts are with you all.

On the pitch, last weekend was a bit of a bruiser for the Sphinx. After a respectable draw in our last game here, we went to Northamptonshire to face Corby Town and suddenly found ourselves short of personnel.

With a number of players absent for various reasons, and with a few of those who were there not match-ready in any way, shape or form, I thought the team acquitted themselves well.

It wouldn't be right to say that 3-0 flattered Corby because they were emphatic in front of goal and controlled the match for a spell after their first, but the result really was only part of the story on this occasion.

Sphinx battled through illness and injury for 90 minutes despite being two goals down at half time, and the attitude of those present was impeccable. It's the same old tale: these boys never, ever let us down for character.

As we now embark upon a run of four consecutive home fixtures in the month of March, we need to dig deep into our reserves of another trait that's served our club well in the last few years.

The ability to shake off a setback and get back on track is essential and we are approaching the

business end of the season. March and April will be big months in the history of this football club and every point must be hunted down and scrapped over until the end of next month.

We'll be back here — hopefully — to face Loughborough Dynamo on Tuesday night. After three postponements, our first meeting of the season will only be two and a half weeks before the second.

March will be historic off the field too. You will see this afternoon that our work towards meeting Step Four ground grading requirements has moved forward significantly even in the last couple of weeks.

That work will be completed by the deadline at the end of this month and the place will look a little different. We thank you for your patience and cooperation.

As we continue to evolve as a club and develop as a team, our sincere hope is that we're able to bring a few new faces through the turnstiles. Winning the title last year and competing in the eighth tier in 2023/24 warrant better attendances.

Everyone thinks their football club is special and everyone is right. The experience of being a part of Sphinx's highest heights has been the proudest involvement I've had in football and I'd love for more people to have the same honour.

For now, I'll settle for four cracking home fixtures and, all being well, some points to add to the tally as we look to finish in the best possible position. That approach worked last year. It'll work again.

It's crunch time. We have a group of players willing to stand up and be counted. Up the Sphinx!

The history of Coventry Sphinx began in 1946. Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft FC had been highly successful in the city before and during the Second World War and changed their name to Sphinx FC.

AWA's legacy was replicated by the new club. Sphinx won a number of league and cup competitions throughout the 1950s and 1960s before playing a major role in the formation of the Coventry Alliance and continuing to win trophies in the following decades.

Coventry underwent significant socioeconomic change in the 1990s. The recession led to the closure of factories in the city and surrounding areas, which in turn led to the dissolution of many of Coventry's football clubs. Sphinx needed a new challenge and joined the Midland Combination Football League in 1993.

In our first season in the Midland Combination we were promoted from Division 2 and reached the semi-finals of the Birmingham Sunday Vase. A second consecutive promotion followed thanks to a second-placed finish in Division 1 the next season.

With promotion to the top division of the Midland Combination secured it was decided that the club should be linked more closely to our city. We became Coventry Sphinx and the first match under our new name was against a Coventry City XI at our home ground.

Throughout its history, our club has been served by countless loyal and hard-working local people who've contributed enormously to Coventry Sphinx on and off the field. Through their dedication we

have achieved some unbeatable highs. There have also been times of great tragedy.

In November 2001, Sphinx manager Willie Knibbs was killed in a car accident on the way home from a cup match at Meir KA. Willie was a former Sphinx player in his second spell as manager. His death was a terrible loss to our club and to local football in Coventry.

After a painful season, Sphinx went on to win the Midland Combination Challenge Cup and it was renamed the Willie Knibbs Cup as a mark of respect. Our main stand is also named in Willie's honour.

Sphinx became one of the leading teams in the Midland Combination Premier League, finishing as runners-up in our first season and again in both 2005 and 2006. We reached the final of the Endsleigh Challenge Cup on three occasions, losing to Alveston at Villa Park in 1999 but beating Coventry Marconi in 2003 and Feckenham in 2005.

We also won the Coventry Evening Telegraph Cup in successive seasons, making Sphinx the last winners of the competition at Highfield Road and the first at the Ricoh Arena.

Although first team success is a driving force, the heartbeat of our club is the thriving junior section. Formed in 1997, it started with just three teams and has grown ever since. There are now hundreds of players representing Coventry Sphinx and we were the first club in Coventry to achieve the FA Charter.

Our youth team started competing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League in 2003 and one of the

biggest successes to date came in the 2014/15 season, when they won the double after suffering only one league defeat and beating Stourbridge 3-0 in the Birmingham County FA Midweek Floodlit Youth Cup.

Under manager Paul Charnley, Coventry Sphinx's men's first team completed a remarkable treble achievement in May 2007.

In addition to finally becoming champions of the Midland Football Combination – achieving promotion to the Midland Football Alliance in the process – Sphinx won the Coventry Charity Cup and the BCFA Midland Floodlit Cup.

The 2007/08 season saw Sphinx enjoy our best ever run in the FA Vase, reaching the quarter-final for the very first time and losing controversially to Kirkham & Wesham, the eventual Wembley winners, in a replay at Sphinx Drive.

We made a run to the semi-finals of the League Cup in the same season and went on to win the Midland Alliance Polymac League Cup by beating Westfields in the final in 2009/10.

In 2014/15 the club was honoured to become a founder member of the Midland Football League Premier Division. After a top ten finish under Stuart Dutton, Lee Knibbs took over as manager in the autumn of 2017.

Lee is the son of Willie Knibbs and returned to the club after an earlier spell as assistant manager to Danny McSheffrey.

He guided Sphinx to some of our most memorable results of the decade before deciding to step aside in November 2019.

Knibbs was succeeded by his assistants, John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, who became the club's joint managers and ended the truncated 2019/20 season on a long unbeaten run, the foundation of Sphinx's greatest achievement to come.

Sphinx made a sideways move as part of FA restructuring ahead of the 2021/22 season, competing in a newly formed Premier Division South in the United Counties League.

In our first season we finished in fourth place, losing only twice in the second half of the season, and enjoyed a long run in the FA Vase, narrowly missing out on another quarter-final.

The following season saw Sphinx lose on penalties again in the same round of the FA Vase but 2022/23 was the best season in our history.

In the space of one week in April, our club acquired the freehold to the Sphinx Drive ground for the very first time and secured the United Counties League Premier Division South title with a 7-0 win against Eynesbury Rovers.

Sphinx won all of the last eleven league matches to close a big gap at the top and become champions. We scored 106 goals and ended the season three points clear of runners-up Rugby Town to confirm promotion to the Northern Premier League Midlands Division. 2023/24 is our first ever season at Step 4.

Football never stands still. Local football in Coventry has declined over the years, so to be playing at our highest ever level after more than seventy years is an achievement of which the players, officials and supporters of our club can be proud.

The structure in place at senior, youth and junior levels for both men and women promises a bright future for Coventry Sphinx as we work towards the progress Willie Knibbs' memory deserves.





COVENTRY SPHINX 1 RUGBY TOWN 1

Pitching In NPL **Division One Midlands** Saturday 17th February 2024

Last season's United Counties League Premier Division South top two met for the second time at Step Four and shared the points at the Sphinx Industrial Supplies Arena.

Coventry Sphinx took the lead in the first half but were pegged back by Rugby Town early in the second. A red card left the visitors to play 25 minutes with ten men but they held on for a pulled it down beautifully before having his 1-1 draw with their goalkeeper relatively untroubled.

Joint managers John Woodward and Shaun Thomas made a handful of changes. Leo Wood played to the right of striker Matty Shipman, with Tyler Haddow on the left. Alex Lock and Jack Downes anchored the midfield behind Jac Redhead.



The defensive unit remained unchanged. Goalkeeper Keelan Fallows played behind a back four made up of loe Pursey, Louis Guest. Will Edjenguele and Finlay Shorrock. Guest captained the side in his 300th Sphinx appearance.

Continuing on from a rousing second half in their previous outing at AFC Rushden & Diamonds, Sphinx made a lively start against their neighbours. But it was Fallows who was called into action first, getting down well to deny Rugby skipper Michael Taylor at close range.

With seven minutes played, Haddow threaded a pass through for Shipman. The striker got a shot away but was under sufficient pressure to make it a difficult one and he could only poke it into the arms of goalkeeper Paul Hathaway.

Haddow went closer himself three minutes later. A long free kick found him in the box and first effort blocked by a defender and sending an improvised second over the top.

Sphinx moved through the gears early on. Downes fired a shot wide from 20 yards, just in time for Rugby to arrive in the match as a serious attacking force.

The home team had a solid first quarter of an hour but David Kolodynski got himself into space on the right corner of the Sphinx box. He sliced his shot wide but the Valley enjoyed a good spell of pressure in the middle of the half.

Downes backed himself from outside the area again in the 26th minute, this time seeing his 25-yard shot screw wide with significant help from the wind that whipped around Sphinx Drive.

The home team made the breakthrough with 32 minutes played. An incisive attack on the right culminated in a beauty of a cross to the near post from Shipman. Haddow got across his marker, glanced a header past Hathaway and claimed his first Sphinx goal.

Sphinx controlled the rest of the half and were on top after the goal, but Taylor went closest with a header from a free kick that flashed wide of Fallows' goal. The home team took a one-goal lead into the break but wouldn't hold on to it much longer.

The second half was defined by moments of chaos that might have redirected the outcome either way. Sphinx made the early running but Rugby equalised out of nowhere in the third minute of the half.

Jamie Melbourne's cross from the left caught the wind and swung high over the grasp of Fallows before dropping into the far corner of the Sphinx net to make it 1-1.

After levelling the score, Rugby mounted a period of sustained pressure, relieved intermittently by threatening Sphinx counter-attacks. One such break led to a key moment that changed the timbre of the game.



With 25 minutes remaining, Sphinx caught the Valley defensive line high and got in behind. Shipman was clipped by Liam Francis and the defender was shown his second yellow card of the game.

Rugby kept the eleven men of Sphinx honest with long balls into Taylor and Madundo Semahimbo but the remainder of the match looked like a team with a full complement against a team with ten men.



Sphinx used the man advantage to create a number of chances but nothing to test Hathaway in the Rugby goal. Five minutes from time, substitute Ashton Demulder fired over from 25 yards and, in terms of efforts on goal, that was that.

There was some frustration at missing out on a win against ten men but Sphinx didn't do enough with their attacking possession after the dismissal of Francis and didn't carve out many real opportunities to get Hathaway working in the Rugby goal.

Results elsewhere in the bottom six ensured that both teams could look at this as a point gained on those around them.

Sphinx had the added bonus of preventing Rugby from closing the gap as they began a run of fixtures dominated by home games.

A visit to Corby Town will be followed by three home games in eight days against Shepshed Dynamo, Loughborough Dynamo and Harborough Town.

Cambridge City come to Coventry on Saturday 16th March to make it four home matches on the bounce.

Unlike a lot of the football supporters I know, I have no idea what was the first match I watched on television or even the first match I attended in person. I don't remember going to a game aware it was my first and I can't place an earliest memory now, more than three decades later.

It simply isn't there. No nostalgic flash across the hippocampus. No potential candidates for the dubious accolade. There's just a sort of mush in which five years of formative football have congealed into what I think of as the

What that means is that I was taken to football very young, which in turn means that I remember – just – a time when football wasn't fashionable and actually going to matches was sometimes considered a little weird.

It's hard to imagine now but it's not all that long ago that football was grubby. Not state ownership grubby or corrupt governing bodies grubby or financial doping grubby, but actually grubby.

Even Premier League grounds were ramshackle in the first half of the 1990s and those lower down were so run-down that they seemed to transcend ugliness and acquire an earthy romanticism, bathed in that strange beautiful orange glow that only the streets around football grounds have on a Tuesday evening.

I didn't realise until much later that I was getting into football right in the eye of stormy change. It wasn't cool, yet, but it was growing in popularity and the polish of the Premier League was gradually being applied.

Football was in the midst of history, for better and worse, and its public perception was shifting too.

Football's place in society in the early 1990s wasn't a positive one. The breakaway league was bouncing from stadium to satellite to television set in the afterglow of World Cup Italia '90 but outsiders still considered it a dirty and dangerous

It's not difficult to understand where that sentiment originated. The Hillsborough Disaster was a tragedy for all of football and all of football had to take on the chin that it would add to the game's negative reputation.

It's thanks to the dedication and determination of Hillsborough survivors, families and campaigners since 1989 that the disaster is, broadly, not used to criticise football or football supporters to this day.

Nevertheless, the 1980s left football supporter culture on its and distances shrank, football's enduring global appeal was arse. Sure, there are those of us who liked that it was rough around the edges, even a little perilous.

We like an edge, a frisson in the air. But few of us actually want to beat people up or be beaten up ourselves, yet racism and hooliganism defined football in the eyes of outsiders.

Thatcher, Moynihan, The National Front, ID cards, Fences, electrified and otherwise. These are the bastard outcomes of football's perception immediately prior to the dawn of the Premier League, each and every one defeated by supporters. What ended with the Premier League ticking into the

Turns out the football generation before mine wasn't so bad after all.

Yet the place occupied in the national psyche by those very supporters had been manipulated by the poisonous and deliberate slander of the Conservative government and its rancid red-top state media.

Even with the Premier League in place it would take a home tournament and the adoption of the recommendations of the Taylor Report to make football feel accessible.

1996 was a cultural moment unlike any other. The confluence of EURO '96, Britpop and surging New Labour is overstated but in the simplified understanding of an elevenyear-old boy obsessed with football and infatuated with music, the felt phenomenon was lightning in a bottle.

English football and my experience of it have grown together. I'm lucky to be the age I am and grateful to have been thrust into the football world when I was, perfectly positioned to ride the wave and let the surface-level sociology of it wash over me while being blissfully unaware of how simplistic those interpretations were.

Football's cycle of cool is seldom about the football. On either side of the turn of the 1980s, casuals brought men's fashion into football. Frequently connected to hooligan firms and intrinsically linked with working class male culture in England, casuals served to anchor the game in the social world around it at a time when both sorely needed to have a Therein lies the powderkeg. If young fans are priced out of look at themselves.

Casual culture itself might have ebbed away but it still has wellsprings among football supporters and its impact can be seen at the match today, almost with ubiquity. Keen observers of the narrative timeline will note that casuals didn't make football fashionable on the outside. There's only so much a Lacoste polo and Ralph Lauren harrington can do.

But that collision of football and fashion underpins the sport's cool in the modern day. Scroll through the leading lifestyle blogs and it won't be long before you find one of two versions of football's undeniable x-factor.

Whether it's the traditional sportswear manufacturers collaborating with fashion houses and boutique designers of impossible cool, or said designers simply taking the game as their raw materials, football-inspired street style is everywhere and it has been for some time.

Football itself has kept pace. Capitalising on its position at the forefront of culture when the world rocked on its axis supercharged by easy access. If football is nothing but a sport with some stories attached, modern communications technology was made for it and rampant commercial zeal ensured the opportunity wasn't missed.

But there's an historical context too. Had football not developed in the way it did in the second half of the last century, the Premier League wouldn't have happened and the Extremely Online fanatics of Twitter would now be sending each other badly spelled death threats about tennis.

millennium as a sporting cosmopolitan bazaar for the world to enjoy began with the abolition of the maximum wage for players in 1961 and England winning the World Cup five and a half years later.

Society has long held wealthy young men in either contempt or esteem depending on a suite of factors we shan't go into, but there's no doubt that other young men - or a large proportion of them, at least – consider them aspirational. That's been building in football now for sixty years.

There's an argument that what we've experienced in football supporter culture over those six decades are waves of fashion and football, lapping at one another with the wild electricity of youth culture. If that's the case, if football's fashionable appeal is somehow cyclical, it should be sloping back off into the shadows any day now.

There are harbingers and they rest, as ever, at the whim of the next generation. As such they're ungraspable to me, but as a sociological observer it seems that esports players and streaming celebrities, though they piggyback on "proper" football for now, are one such threat.

All else being equal that shouldn't be a problem. People can enjoy many passions in life and it's even better when they're complementary, so EA FC streaming should go hand in hand quite happily with Fantasy Premier League, Football Manager, watching the Premier League on television, and going to the match.

going to the football in person they can never become supporters. Their passions will become not complementary but competitive, and it's the old-fashioned one that will miss

Football will continue. Football shirts on Hypebeast might not. PSG might even go back to being a football club.

Football will always be attractive to an enormous number of people irrespective of their generation. It's too intoxicating not to be. But that doesn't mean it'll always be fashionable nor in fashion.

Consumer culture and youth culture don't stand still and football, though it's kept up with remarkable consistency for a very long time now, could eventually drift away from the

CORBY TOWN 3 COVENTRY SPHINX 0

After a home draw against Rugby Town, Coventry Sphinx travelled to Northamptonshire to face Corby Town in good spirits but with their preparation having been disrupted.

Corby ran out 3-0 winners at Steel Park, the scoreline reflecting their ability to be clinical in front of goal rather than dominate the match from start to finish. Sphinx rued chances not taken and a poor period after the Steelmen broke the deadlock.



Suspension, injury, illness and absence played a big role in team selection for joint managers John Woodward and Shaun Thomas.

Callum Whiteside and James Bryson came into the side to play in defence in front of goalkeeper Keelan Fallows. Louis Guest continued as captain.

Joe Pursey and Finlay Shorrock started at wing back, while Jack Downes, Luke Downes and Alfonso Castellano made up the midfield behind Matty Shipman and Leo Wood. Sphinx made a positive start but it was the hosts who made inroads after the first few minutes. They won the aerial duel from a free kick to force Fallows into a save and a Sphinx defender then needed to turn the loose ball away.



From the resulting corner, the visitors had to clear an effort off the line. That early spell for Corby eased as Sphinx settled on the ball again, playing some nice football at times but also seeking to get the Steelmen turned quickly.

A long throw-in from Pursey was partially cleared but found Jack Downes, whose left-footed effort was well struck but zipped wide of the Corby goal.

Sphinx enjoyed a solid first 25 minutes in possession, looking sharp on the ball but unable to give the opposition goalkeeper much to be concerned about. At the other end, Fallows had to save again in the 21st minute as Corby's opportunities started to flow.

The visitors had to make an unwelcome change when Shorrock, already far from fully fit, had to be replaced by the equally unready Jordan Hayward, who put in a shift on the left that his lungs wouldn't have appreciated.

The match was effectively won by two goals in the space of five minutes. Corby broke the

deadlock just before the half hour when Tristan Thompson-Matthews slid in to prod home the rebound after another Fallows save.

In the 34th minute, an attack on the left eventually led to the ball falling for Joe Butterworth 25 yards from goal. His low drive was perfectly struck and thumped one post before hitting the net just inside the other to make it 2-0.

This was not an afternoon for a comeback. With Sphinx rocking, Corby set about the search for a third goal.

A header sailed wide ten minutes before half time and a much easier chance was squandered soon after. Sphinx's first test of the second half was to get a foot on the ball and have a say in the match again.

The attitude and character shown in the second half was nothing more than we've come to expect but it was good to see nonetheless. It was hard going but the players never gave up on the match and started the second period on the front foot.



Ten minutes in, Wood fired over after a couple of ricochets in the box. Pursey's tremendous work on the right generated the opening.

Ashton Demulder came on for Castellano after 57 minutes and got straight into the task.

Sphinx were playing reasonably well but the chances wouldn't come. Instead, Fallows made a fantastic save at the other end to deny a long-range effort he didn't see until late and Sphinx were limited to a clean 25-yard strike from Luke Downes that took a nick and went just over.

Less than a minute later, Corby scored their third. Play was allowed to continue despite a clear handball in midfield and Reuben Marshall was able to step onto a shot which he smashed in off the bar.

The matter of whether the ball crossed the line was disputed but the assistant referee awarded the goal and Shaun Thomas was sent from the dugout in the aftermath.

Corby controlled what was left of the match. Connor Tomlinson hit the post with ten minutes to go and Fallows made sure 3-0 didn't become 4-0 with an excellent save three minutes from time.

Even at 3-0, the visitors kept working hard and demonstrated their commitment to the Sphinx cause.

That sense of pride will be the minimum required as they head into a crucial run of four home games against high quality opposition.

Those matches won't define the season for Sphinx. There will be plenty to play for in the last month of the season regardless of how they turn out.

But some points in the bag over the next four weeks – an aim this group of players is eminently capable of achieving – would go a very long way.



The reaction to the news that football's lawmakers plan to trial blue cards and ten-minute sin bins was hostile. Reports that the International Football Associations Board (IFAB) had lined up testing were swiftly denied by FIFA, such was the vitriol.

Whether the initial whiff was briefed by or leaked out of IFAB, the chilly response was made all the more remarkable by the fact that dissent – one of the two offences for which the potential blue card would be issued – is generally accepted to be an issue that does need addressing.

Dissent is a problem. It's possible to make an argument in bad faith that viewing it as such is somehow soft or weak, but dissent isn't just an irritation or a question of preference. It creates a negative environment for officials in the elite game, the ultimate outcomes of which include conspiracy theories, defamation and the establishment of referees as a modern football folk devil.

In non-league, grassroots and youth football, the effect of that is tangible. Real people are really abused and really assaulted. Recruiting referees is all but impossible and it all starts with dissent on the field. Why, then, are sin bins not seen as a potential solution?

The blue card is a red herring. It's undoubtedly part of the reason for agitation but the colour of the card is of little consequence. Likewise, the apparent desire to roll cynical fouls into the sin bin equation merely exposes it as the populist window dressing that it is. Football has a problem that most sensible observers recognise. Sin bins don't fix it.

It's telling that the discussion in the wake of the IFAB leak ignored almost entirely the fact that trialling sin bins in non-league – and let's be honest, the idea of trialling something in meaningful matches is a fallacy anyway – has been happening for years. From the ninth tier of English football down, the National League System has sin bins.

There are no blue cards in non-league but there are tenminute sin bins in place for dissent, along with a somewhat confused realignment of the logic of a yellow card. It's out there in the wild and has been for some time. It's already being faux-trialled. It's already bedded in. We've already seen it in action. We've already got the data.

After the 2019/20 season, the Football Association hailed the performance of the sin bin in non-league and grassroots football. Temporary dismissals had, it claimed, reduced dissent by 38 percent across 31 participant leagues.

If that suggests that ten-minute temporary dismissals have significantly improved the amount of dissent faced by non-league referees, you should spend a few Saturday afternoons, ears wide open, at Step Five matches. There are three types of lies: lies, damned lies, and statistics.

The introduction of sin bins hasn't reduced dissent. Not even slightly. There's a case to be made that they've made the problem of endemic dissent worse rather than better. Sin bins have reduced the number of yellow cards issued for dissent. You can decide for yourself whether that's a positive development.

The way the sin bin is applied in non-league is dysfunctional at best. It's necessarily subject to the whims of referees

when it has to be a zero-tolerance fix if it's to have any chance of succeeding. Some referees are less affected by dissent than others. All referees are thick-skinned but some skins are thicker than others.

Officials have always had differing tolerance levels and that has predictably translated into their willingness to use the sin bin.

In a game that has referees with varying degrees of leniency and even a taste for giving some back every now and again, the end result has been to raise the threshold that dissent must reach before the average match official decides it must be dealt with. Thus, yellow cards for dissent decline but dissent does not.

Consistency between instances of dissent within the same match is an issue as well, but that's by the by. The sin bin fundamentally fails in its only purpose and that, if a trial really meant a trial, would have knocked it into a cocked hat years ago.

It doesn't work and that's why football supporters – the people who know and understand the behaviour and motivations of football players intuitively – know instinctively that it's a bad idea. Sticking a blue card on top just made it easier for them to dismiss out of hand.

There are other negatives. Taking a gobby player off the pitch for ten minutes is unlike sending one off permanently. It's eminently manageable for the team that's a player short, and so managing it is what they do.

Ten minutes (and it is, in theory, ten minutes of ball-in-play time) of attack versus defence later, they're back to eleven against eleven and away they go once more. As unintended consequences go, that's a doozy. It changes football at its root, and for nothing.

If sin bins aren't the answer to a question everybody seems to agree is in dire need of one, then what is? Maybe football will need to find a way to reshape itself a little bit around the radical notion of treating referees like human beings.

Maybe the game does need to crank up the harshness of repercussions and make clear to referees that dissent is not a matter for their discretion.

Hell, maybe the sin bin will emerge as part of what will surely be a multi-faceted fix. But let's start at the beginning. Dissent by word or action is a yellow card offence already covered under Law 12 of the Laws of the Game. Using offensive, insulting or abusive language and/or action is a sending off offence. In both cases the wording is clear and no room is left for interpretation.

Until referees stop selectively putting up with those offences – and the uncomfortable truth is that they do exactly that – we simply can't know whether or not we already have adequate legislation. Football should explore that avenue before messing itself up any further.

SHEPSHED DYNAMO

Shepshed, in NW Leicestershire, has had football teams associated with it since 1879. Whilst many of these achieved local recognition over the years, it was with the formation of the Charterhouse club in the mid-1970's, that the name of Shepshed became known nationally.

Between 1978 and 1984, the club rose from the lower reaches of the Leicestershire Senior League to the summit of the Southern League Premier Division, winning seven consecutive promotions (including six successive championship titles) on the way.

They also reached both the semi-final and quarter-final of the FA Vase, as well as the First Round Proper of the FA Cup. Unfortunately, the club, then known by its original name of Shepshed Albion, closed down in 1994.

1994 to 2004

The current Dynamo club was formed in the summer of 1994. Initially playing in the newly formed Midland Alliance, the club enjoyed a successful first season, finishing 4th. The following season, under Manager Mark O'Kane, the club won the title by eight points including a remarkable 23 game unbeaten start.

After a hectic summer of improvement works, the club took up their place in the Southern Football League for the 1996/97 campaign. Whilst league success proved harder to come by, the club more than made up for this in the FA Cup by reaching the First Round Proper. Despite a heavy away defeat at the hands of Carlisle United, the memory of the day will live long with all that were there.

The second season proved less successful, and with the team struggling near to the bottom of the league. O'Kane was replaced in February 1998, by John Hanna, The change brought a creditable 16th place by the end.

1998/99 saw the best league season to date. Shepshed were in the top six of the league for most of the season, but slipped to a final placing of 10th, after a poor run-in. 1999/2000, the centenary year for the club's ground "The Dovecote", saw a season-long battle against relegation, a final placing of 18th and the resignation of Hanna in July 2000. His assistant, Dave Williams, was appointed.

His first season in charge saw a 15th place finish. The next two Barry Baker and Bob Norris were appointed for 2010/11. As saw the financial purse strings tightened, however whilst Shepshed flirted with relegation, a 16th place position was recorded in both. The summer of 2003 saw a change in the constitution of the football club that led to it becoming a private limited company.

However, in footballing terms, the season can be fairly described as disastrous, as it saw two changes in management after Williams was sacked in October and his successor Dave Clay resigned in January. Pete McGurk then took charge of first team matters but despite improved results, he had insufficient time to prevent Shepshed from finishing bottom of the Southern League Western Division.

However, restructuring in the summer of 2004 reprieved Dynamo and saw them start their 10th anniversary season as members of the UniBond League. McGurk led the team to a respectable 15th place finish in a season that also saw them win the Loughborough Charity Cup and Coalville Charity Cup double.

2005 to date

Season 2005/06 culminated in a fine 10th place finish and saw the club receive the UniBond League Club Of The Month Award, Fair Play Award and Goalscorers Award for April 2006. Dynamo also reached the finals of both the Loughborough and Coalville Charity Cups.

McGurk resigned in December 2006, with the club in 15th place, replaced by his assistant Adam Stevens. He resigned in April 2007 after a 1-6 defeat at second-bottom Chorley left Dynamo in 20th place (5th bottom), Former Belper Town manager Martin Rowe was appointed in May 2007, however his reign was to last only until November, after a dismal start to the season.

Ex Sutton Town and Gedling Town manager Lee Wilson was Rowe's replacement. Fortunes soon turned around and Dynamo ultimately finished in 15th position. The 2007/08 season finished with silverware after Shepshed lifted the Loughborough Charity Cup with a 3-1 victory over nearneighbours Loughborough Dynamo.

The 2008/09 season saw fortunes dramatically change for the better, with Shepshed ending the season in 8th place, their highest league table position for 13 years, however Wilson resigned immediately after the end of the season. Dave Stringer and Jimmy Ginnelly were announced to lead Shepshed into the 2009/10 season, but following a difficult season. Dave parted company with Shepshed.

the season started Baker was hit by a serious illness, and forced to resign. Dynamo appointed Dave Frecklington but this again failed to last and he was relieved of his duties after a string of poor results that saw Shepshed finish in 21st position leading to relegation. However Shepshed were

reprieved following financial problems at Rushden & Diamonds.

John Ramshaw was appointed the new manager as Evo-Stik Division One South football was awarded to Shepshed for the 2011/2 season. In October Eastwood Town persuaded Ramshaw to take over their hot seat. His assistant Chris (Chalky) White was given the post in November 2011. In 2012, with new Chairman Mick Sloan, Shepshed Dynamo competed in the United Counties League, where after a mixed start ended the season on a high finishing in 9th position and beating local rivals Ouorn FC 5-0 to lift the Loughborough Charity Cup.

In 2013-14 Shepshed were yet again moved sideways to compete in the Midland Football Alliance and after a season of mixed results finished in 16th place. Jim Wynne and Matt Houldsworth began the campaign with a mix of old and new players signed.

In November they were replaced by the successful championship winning leff Stocking from Oadby. strengthening the squad but finished the season in 15th place. For the 2014-15 season Jeff was joined by former Loughborough and Quorn manager John Folwell and they recruited a squad of talented young players who enjoyed an unbeaten pre-season. Due to business requirements Jeff stood down with John being joined by Jimmy Gray. Before the completion of that season however John also had to resign due to promotion at work. Jimmy Gray saw out the season, helped by Andy Hohn, and the side finished fourth.

The management team for the 2016/17 season assembled the also joining the coaching staff. bulk of last season's successful side and a mix of experienced players with a group of promising youngsters. Although staying in the higher end of the league for most of the season, including reaching the last 32 in the FA Vase and winning the Loughborough Charity Cup, the club finished fifteenth.

For the 2017-18 campaign again a mix of last season's players plus experienced additions were to represent the club with hopes of a much higher finish in the league table. A competitive season ended with a 7th position but also the loss of manager Gray. This saw ex-Gresley manager Damion Beckford-Quailey take charge and a squad comprising some of last term's players joined by new faces and several ex-Shepshed favourites returning to the Dovecote.

The FA allocation to leagues for season 2019-20 saw the club again moved to the United Counties for a second time. Damion remained as manager, assisted by Wayne Scott and Dave Clay. Several new faces were included in the squad.

Season 2019-20 saw the club in a very strong position for promotion before the Covid pandemic caused the season to be null and void. With a late start, 2020-21 was a busy one with the club retaining most of the squad and being joined by three additions and increased coaching staff. Despite this, during the FA restructuring, we were finally promoted back to step 4 via the PPG system after over 10 years at step 5.

In the first season back at Step 4 in 2021, Dynamo Manager Damion Beckford Quailey, assisted by Gary Drake, managed an impressive 11th placed finished, gaining points of each of the top eight teams in the league. In the following season they finished with an almost identical record as the season before.

The 2023-24 season sees Manager Damion Beckford-Quailey along with assistant Gary Drake remain at the club with additions to the technical area as Matt Melbourne makes the transition from player to coach, alongside Nick Fairbrother in

Several new replacement players have arrived to fill the vacant areas in the squad following several players moving to higher level, and long-standing captain Jake Betts announcing his retirement.
