John and Shaun have done a fantastic job to get us to this point. The job isn't done yet and one more big push is required, but to win the games we have, at a level we've never reached before, is an achievement we'll be looking back upon for years to come. It's been quite a ride.

The committee, officials and volunteers have more than played their part. I'd like to thank them all for their graft and dedication this season. Coventry Sphinx is a bigger and better club than it was when we came out of lockdown, and it's down to you.

Finally, to our loyal supporters as we reach the end of the season with just Hinckley LR away to come next weekend: thank you.

The history of Coventry Sphinx began in 1946. Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft FC had been highly successful in the city before and during the Second World War and changed their name to Sphinx FC.

AWA's legacy was replicated by the new club. Sphinx won a number of league and cup competitions throughout the 1950s and 1960s before playing a major role in the formation of the Coventry Alliance and continuing to win trophies in the following decades.

Coventry underwent significant socioeconomic change in the 1990s. The recession led to the closure of factories in the city and surrounding areas, which in turn led to the dissolution of many of Coventry's football clubs. Sphinx needed a new challenge and joined the Midland Combination Football League in 1993.

In our first season in the Midland Combination we were promoted from Division 2 and reached the semi-finals of the Birmingham Sunday Vase. A second consecutive promotion followed thanks to a second-placed finish in Division 1 the next season.

With promotion to the top division of the Midland Combination secured it was decided that the club should be linked more closely to our city. We became Coventry Sphinx and the first match under our new name was against a Coventry City XI at our home ground.

Throughout its history, our club has been served by countless loyal and hard-working local people who've contributed enormously to Coventry Sphinx on and off the field. Through their dedication we

have achieved some unbeatable highs. There have also been times of great tragedy.

In November 2001, Sphinx manager Willie Knibbs was killed in a car accident on the way home from a cup match at Meir KA. Willie was a former Sphinx player in his second spell as manager. His death was a terrible loss to our club and to local football in Coventry.

After a painful season, Sphinx went on to win the Midland Combination Challenge Cup and it was renamed the Willie Knibbs Cup as a mark of respect. Our main stand is also named in Willie's honour.

Sphinx became one of the leading teams in the Midland Combination Premier League, finishing as runners-up in our first season and again in both 2005 and 2006. We reached the final of the Endsleigh Challenge Cup on three occasions, losing to Alveston at Villa Park in 1999 but beating Coventry Marconi in 2003 and Feckenham in 2005.

We also won the Coventry Evening Telegraph Cup in successive seasons, making Sphinx the last winners of the competition at Highfield Road and the first at the Ricoh Arena.

Although first team success is a driving force, the heartbeat of our club is the thriving junior section. Formed in 1997, it started with just three teams and has grown ever since. There are now hundreds of players representing Coventry Sphinx and we were the first club in Coventry to achieve the FA Charter.

Our youth team started competing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League in 2003 and one of the

biggest successes to date came in the 2014/15 season, when they won the double after suffering only one league defeat and beating Stourbridge 3-0 in the Birmingham County FA Midweek Floodlit Youth Cup.

Under manager Paul Charnley, Coventry Sphinx's men's first team completed a remarkable treble achievement in May 2007.

In addition to finally becoming champions of the Midland Football Combination – achieving promotion to the Midland Football Alliance in the process – Sphinx won the Coventry Charity Cup and the BCFA Midland Floodlit Cup.

The 2007/08 season saw Sphinx enjoy our best ever run in the FA Vase, reaching the quarter-final for the very first time and losing controversially to Kirkham & Wesham, the eventual Wembley winners, in a replay at Sphinx Drive.

We made a run to the semi-finals of the League Cup in the same season and went on to win the Midland Alliance Polymac League Cup by beating Westfields in the final in 2009/10.

In 2014/15 the club was honoured to become a founder member of the Midland Football League Premier Division. After a top ten finish under Stuart Dutton, Lee Knibbs took over as manager in the autumn of 2017.

Lee is the son of Willie Knibbs and returned to the club after an earlier spell as assistant manager to Danny McSheffrey.

He guided Sphinx to some of our most memorable results of the decade before deciding to step aside in November 2019.

Knibbs was succeeded by his assistants, John Woodward and Shaun Thomas, who became the club's joint managers and ended the truncated 2019/20 season on a long unbeaten run, the foundation of Sphinx's greatest achievement to come.

Sphinx made a sideways move as part of FA restructuring ahead of the 2021/22 season, competing in a newly formed Premier Division South in the United Counties League.

In our first season we finished in fourth place, losing only twice in the second half of the season, and enjoyed a long run in the FA Vase, narrowly missing out on another quarter-final.

The following season saw Sphinx lose on penalties again in the same round of the FA Vase but 2022/23 was the best season in our history.

In the space of one week in April, our club acquired the freehold to the Sphinx Drive ground for the very first time and secured the United Counties League Premier Division South title with a 7-0 win against Eynesbury Rovers.

Sphinx won all of the last eleven league matches to close a big gap at the top and become champions. We scored 106 goals and ended the season three points clear of runners-up Rugby Town to confirm promotion to the Northern Premier League Midlands Division. 2023/24 is our first ever season at Step 4.

Football never stands still. Local football in Coventry has declined over the years, so to be playing at our highest ever level after more than seventy years is an achievement of which the players, officials and supporters of our club can be proud.

The structure in place at senior, youth and junior levels for both men and women promises a bright future for Coventry Sphinx as we work towards the progress Willie Knibbs' memory deserves.



COVENTRY SPHINX 1 WALSALL WOOD 2

Pitching In NPL
Division One Midlands
Saturday 6th April 2024

Coventry Sphinx produced an impressive response to going down to ten men but were unable to avoid defeat against Walsall Wood in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands.

The sending off of Keelan Fallows was a controversial decision by the referee with the Wood already leading 2-1 and it threatened to spoil the game. Instead, Sphinx rallied behind captain Callum Woodward, who went in goal for an hour, and looked as likely as the visitors to score the game's fourth goal.

Woodward did his bit, keeping a clean sheet and making a string of saves to keep the match on an even keel despite the disadvantage in numbers. His double save from the penalty spot in the immediate aftermath of the red card was merely the start.

The skipper began the game in a new-look midfield, where he anchored Jack Downes, Alfonso Castellano and Cam Moore. Joe Pursey, Louis Guest, Jamie Draper and Finlay Shorrock made up an unchanged back four, while there was a start up front for Leo Wood alongside Leo Brown.

Walsall Wood settled into the game immediately despite the wind whipping around Sphinx Drive. They had a foot on the ball early, got forward quickly and were soon on top. The first shot on goal fell for the hosts, though, and Wood goalkeeper Dale Eve had to save well from Brown and react sharply to thwart Wood as he followed in.

But by the time the visitors took the lead, it had been coming. A neat passing move culminated in excellent footwork by Kevin Monteiro as he strode into the Sphinx penalty area. He kept his composure, opened the space up for a shot, and slotted it past Fallows and into the bottom corner.

The away side continued to have the bulk of the possession but Sphinx again had a good look at goal against the run of play in the 18th minute. This time, they took the chance.

Wood's determined work and deft touch in the penalty area allowed him to tee up Moore, who

swung a sweetly struck left-footed shot into the corner of Eve's net.

The frantic first half continued and Walsall Wood's winning goal was scored as early as the 23rd minute. The referee awarded them a free kick not far outside the box and Corey Cooper's low shot found its way through the wall and had plenty of power to hit the bottom corner.

Walsall Wood used the ball nicely throughout the first quarter of the match and were good value for the lead, with Sphinx barely at the races before the game's big talking point seemed to kick them into gear.

With half an hour played, the Wood got in behind and Fallows came off his line to meet Charlie Manners. Manners beat the goalkeeper, took a step past him and missed the target with a shot off-balance. Having allowed the forward to go on and shoot, the referee pulled it back and awarded a penalty for what he deemed a foul by Fallows.

If Walsall Wood were as surprised as anyone else at the awarding of a penalty, they were stunned by the red card. Fallows had made a genuine attempt to play the ball and Manners was forced wide by his touch past the goalkeeper. Without a substitute goalkeeper, Sphinx had to turn to their skipper.

It's not always easier to play against ten men. Sphinx were clearly lifted by the adverse circumstances and had more of an edge when they were a man down than they had in the first half an hour.

Guest headed wide of the back post from a Moore corner before half time, and a partially cleared Downes cross from the right ended up with Castellano just outside the box. The midfielder didn't quite catch his volley but it didn't go far wide of Eve's post.

Sphinx were further inconvenienced at half time, when Brown had to be withdrawn with a knock. Jordan Hayward's introduction from the bench necessitated some tweaks on the field and, while Sphinx were naturally up against it in the early knockings of the second half, the set-up after the break started to work in their favour.

Woodward was tested. On the hour, he made a superb diving save to keep out a shot from the edge of the penalty area. He made an even better save in the middle of the half but on either side of those stops, Sphinx fought hard to protect him and made plenty of headway at the other end too.



With 20 minutes left, Walsall Wood won another free kick from relatively close range. Cooper beat the wall again, over the top this time, and Woodward's best save of the half was needed to keep his team within a goal.

The captain wasn't alone in performing well. The second half display from the Sphinx was gutsy, not just defensively but in terms of attacking intent.

They were further hindered by injury with quarter of an hour remaining, when Draper was taken off and replaced by Will Edjenguele in the middle of the defence.

The home team pushed on regardless and nearly got caught out six minutes from time. Walsall Wood broke away and reached the final third with three attackers facing just Edjenguele and Woodward.

They found their spare man to the runner's right but Woodward, yet again, was able to make the save.

Eve didn't have nearly as many efforts to save in the second half but Sphinx's determination was such that the visitors sought to manage the last few minutes and stoppage time by playing in the corners. With a midfielder in goal, that says plenty about the level of opposition they were facing.

Sphinx couldn't overcome the odds after going down to ten men but Woodward's heroics in goal gave his teammates a platform from which to fight.

They certainly did that, and could have grabbed a second equaliser on another day.

Ultimately, with ten men against eleven for an hour, the hill was just too big to climb.

The management team can take encouragement from the character on display but the need for points remains and Sphinx are not yet safe from relegation.

They face a crucial fixture against Shepshed Dynamo, one point ahead of them with a game in hand, before the remaining games pit them against Anstey Nomads, Boldmere St Michaels and Hinckley Leicester Road.



At the age of 22, Lewisham-born Ruben Loftus-Cheek was named in Gareth Southgate's England squad for FIFA World Cup 2018 in Russia. With ten minutes left of the opening fixture against Tunisia in Volgograd and England in need of a goal to secure a late win, Southgate turned to Loftus-Cheek.

The young Londoner came off the bench to replace Dele Alli, winning his fifth international cap in the process. England got their goal and Loftus-Cheek started the next two group games against Panama and Belgium. He then embarked upon his best Premier League season to date, playing under Maurizio Sarri for Chelsea.

2018/19 was the fulfilment of Loftus-Cheek's Chelsea destiny. He'd been at Stamford Bridge since he was eight years old and spent ten years working his way up the youth ranks – winning the FA Youth Cup twice – and into the first team. He made his debut late in 2014 but barely played as the Blues won the title in 2016/17.

He was loaned to Crystal Palace in the following season and played his way into the England reckoning thanks to an impressive Premier League campaign.

After the World Cup he was even better, this time for Sarri's Chelsea. They won the UEFA Europa League, beating Arsenal

in the final. Two weeks before the London derby in Baku, Loftus-Cheek ruptured his Achilles tendon.

He hasn't played for England since. At club level, his rehabilitation has been less than ideal. After fighting his way back to fitness and making a handful of Chelsea appearances, he went back out on loan to Fulham in 2020/21.

Just like Palace, Fulham seemed to be the making of him. Amid the reliably frenetic doings behind the scenes at Chelsea, Loftus-Cheek dragged himself back into the team. In the two seasons after he returned from Craven Cottage, he played 49 league games. Then he left.

Prior to his injury, the former Chelsea junior had attracted enormous attention as a potential star. As he grew into his career, he started to build a fearsome reputation as a promising and imposing all-round midfielder – imperfect, certainly, but a thoroughly exciting prospect for club and country.

Early assessments from the kind of people who'd know focused often on his maturity. Loftus-Cheek quickly looked assured; his composure on the ball and elegance of movement without it were matched by a rangy physicality

and an attacking threat that came to the fore in Chelsea's successful Europa League campaign.

When considering Loftus-Cheek's spluttering progress at Stamford Bridge since his injury in May 2019, the inability of a series of managers to unlock or even understand that offensive edge is undoubtedly an important factor. He struggled to crack the first team. When he did, the array of positions he filled weren't conducive to getting in the box and making things happen.

Though widely recognised as a talented player, Loftus-Cheek was a square peg in a round hole more often than not by the end of 2022/23. He was good. He was respected. At 27, he still had his peak ahead of him. But he was stuck.

The saving grace was that Loftus-Cheek only had a year left on his contract and he was snapped up for a reported fee of around £15 million by AC Milan, following in the footsteps of Jimmy Greaves and his own former Chelsea team-mate, Fikayo Tomori, in making the move from West London to San Siro. Ray Wilkins was another former Chelsea player who played for the Rossoneri, whose other English alumni are Luther Blissett, Mark Hateley and David Beckham.

Loftus-Cheek signed a four-year contract and, after a positive start to life in Serie A under Stefano Pioli, he was interviewed by *La Gazzetta dello Sport*.

"At Chelsea I felt like a caged animal," he said. "I didn't play as much as I wanted and when it happened I played in positions where I couldn't express myself. Here, however, I have a free mind. I play as a midfielder as I like, and it's like being a child again."

It doesn't take much imagination to read a depth of frustration and a degree of sadness into his comments, and you don't have to peel away too many layers to understand that Chelsea's changing ownership, ludicrous shopping sprees and a succession of managerial lurches from this to that and back again might not make for the best club for a player with his own challenges to overcome.

The sample size is still small but the early evidence suggests that Italy looks good on Loftus-Cheek. Pioli is unlocking his ability and Milan's system taps into both the attacking side of his game – not every Chelsea manager he's had tried to do that consistently – and his effectiveness out of possession. It might as well have been drawn up with Loftus-Cheek in mind

He can look back on January 2024 as one of the finest months of his career. As well as making himself indispensable through his all-round play, he scored four goals in four games including both in a bonkers 2-2 draw against Bologna. A happy knack for being in the right spot for a tap-in or two is a considerable boon.

At the time of writing, Loftus-Cheek has started 16 matches in Serie A and made three appearances off the bench. He's only started more in a full season three times: his two loan seasons and last season at Chelsea. He will pass each of those tallies imminently.

Five goals (all recent) and two assists (both early in the season) is a respectable enough league return for an all-round midfielder. The timing suggests better to come.

Indeed, his 0.36 goals per 90 minutes is higher than all but 2018/19 when he was at the peak of his powers at Stamford Bridge.

That was his best season statistically in a number of regards but Loftus-Cheek's first order of business isn't to scale new heights, just revisit the old one. 2018/19 is the closest match for what he's doing in Milan and, after more than four years, a bad injury and shoddy management, it's starting to look like one hell of a comeback.

He only outscored his expected goals once in the Premier League – curiously, his xG is essentially the same in Serie A as his Premier League average – and that was in his best season at Chelsea. He's outscoring it again now.

He's shooting more than he has in most seasons but he's passing less, a function of his more advanced position and licence to attack. Indeed, his pass completion rate is good but no better than it was in England; he's always been a highly competent footballer.

Loftus-Cheek isn't in the form of his life. To suggest he is would be reductive and a little disrespectful to Chelsea, to Palace, to Fulham, and to the man himself. But he is starting to recapture it. Statistically, it's all going fine. He's passing the eye test too.

Now 28, Loftus-Cheek is a senior player. New club or not, he's expected to be a leader on the pitch. He expects it of himself too, and it was the focus of his comments when he agreed the move to San Siro.

"I understand the weight of the shirt and my responsibility coming into this club," he said. "I've had a lot of experience in football and I can use that. I feel ready and good physically to produce performances for the team, and I'm ready to be a leader."

"I was happy playing for my boyhood club but I didn't really feel content with how much I was contributing to the team. I feel like I have more to give so I thought it was a good time to make a fresh start."

So far, it's going to plan – at least on an individual level. Milan are still working their way out of a lengthy spell of volatility in their fortunes. First- and second-placed finishes haven't been beyond them of late but nor have they been anything like guaranteed.

Loftus-Cheek has played his part in Milan's place in an historically familiar top three at the time of writing, albeit with the Rossoneri realistically looking in on the Scudetto race from the outside.

He's got a few years to make his mark. If his first half a season is anything to go by, Loftus-Cheek is more than capable of making a great success of his time in Serie A and Milan will count him as a smart buy.

Sometimes a change is as good as a rest.

- In Italy, where screening is mandatory for all young people engaged in organised sport, they have reduced the incidence of young sudden cardiac death by 89%.

Sphinx looked to respond. Woodward's free kick in the eighth minute was met by Edjenguele, who guided the ball towards goal.

Shepshed goalkeeper Brandon Ganley made the save and a follow-up from Jack Downes was blocked too.

The visitors were already on top, moving the ball crisply, but it might have been a different game had Sphinx been able to capitalise on their brief spell of causing problems from set pieces at the right end. Woodward's free kick in the tenth minute was another but Guest's thumping header went over the crossbar.

Despite those two chances, the home team were doing all the defending. Second balls weren't going their way and they were losing the midfield battle, so it was very much against the run of play when they equalised after 26

corner. Hayward won the ball and fed it forward for Brown in the left channel. Brown ran his man, faced him up and beat him in the box, cutting back onto his right foot to power a low shot past Ganley for 1-1.



Sphinx were back under pressure straight away but gradually grew into the fight.

Good feet from Jack Downes gave him the chance to slip a ball through for Brown, whose shot was saved this time, and both Edjenguele and Guest came close to forcing in a Woodward corner as the ball curled towards the back post.

The teams exchanged chances in the few minutes before time. Good battling by Shorrock led to Woodward shooting over from 25 yards before a neat piece of skill at the other end produced a shot for Dynamo that was diverted over by a corner.

It's hard to make the case that a team taking the lead before going on to win comfortably was a turning point, but the goal that resulted from another corner was certainly a kick in the teeth on this occasion.

Taken from the Dynamo right, it curled right under the crossbar and was headed in from close range by Niall Prenderville in the fourth minute of first-half stoppage

The second half started badly and Shepshed grabbed another early goal. Just before the hour a free kick was lifted into the box and an own goal made it 3-1. The visitors were good value for the lead but Sphinx made it easy for them and were well beaten even with half an hour remaining.

Tyler Haddow, Ashton Demulder and Leo Wood came off the bench and gave Sphinx a different kind of threat but the moments of danger for Dynamo were few and far between. After their own ambitious shot over in the middle of the half. Brown fired over on the turn from a long free kick into the box.

A badly defended throw-in led to a low shot dragged wide by the visitors in the 74th minute but they didn't have to wait long before scoring their fourth on the counter-



Sphinx's corner went wrong and they were caught out as Shepshed broke. The home team were wide open at the back and were punished for getting into a three-on-one situation by a clean square pass for Shaun Ruzvidzo and a composed finish past Fallows to make it 4-1 with seven minutes remaining.

Haddow zipped a shot just wide in the 89th minute but the final chance of the game went to Dynamo and it was another gift.

Three minutes into stoppage time they were awarded a penalty for a foul by Guest. Kyle Dixon hit the spot kick

straight down the middle to bag Shepshed's fifth and final

To say this was a dismal night for the club would be an understatement.

Sphinx started the game within striking distance of Shepshed and in apparently better form, but the outcome was a sound and deserved thrashing at the most inopportune time.

There are now three games remaining to get out of trouble and there's nothing easy about any of them.

Sphinx have a buffer but they'll have to beat title-chasing Anstey Nomads, a Boldmere St Michaels team who beat them earlier in the season or play-off contenders Hinckley LR if they're to avoid needing it.

Boldmere visit the Sphinx Industrial Supplies Arena on Saturday 20th April in between two visits to Leicestershire.

One of the obvious conclusions from Coventry Sphinx's first season of away games in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Midlands is that there's a noticeable gap between the top of the division and the bottom when the leading teams have their tails up at home.

lack Downes and Callum Woodward got the nod in the centre of midfield, Ashton Demulder played in the hole, and Tyler Haddow came back into the starting eleven to play alongside striker Leo Brown.

The home team had the initiative from the start. Sphinx showed some early nerves and struggled at times to clear their lines. The resulting pressure told in the ninth minute. Anstey opened the scoring with a goal that

couldn't have been simpler from their perspective. A corner kick was delivered, Brad Wilson was wide open for a free header and the hosts were in front.

The momentum showed little sign of shifting immediately after the goal but Sphinx replied with one of their own just six minutes later. It was the highlight of a bleak afternoon.

opportunity for Shorrock. His brilliant delivery was impossible to defend and was met at the back post by Pursey, who thumped in an unstoppable header to make it 1-1.

The Nomads weren't knocked off their stride. Fallows had to get down very smartly to turn away a scuffed shot in the 19th minute before a free kick drifted well wide of his post in the 22nd minute.

But Sphinx were in the game and the contest was more even for a brief spell in the middle of the first half. Haddow got in behind and rolled the ball across for Brown, who was just beaten to it by a defender and rightly surprised by the awarding of a goal kick.

The visitors instantly paid the price in the form of the subsequent second Anstey goal.

A cross came in from the left, Zayn Hakeem got across his marker too cheaply and guided a stooping header past Fallows and into the net

The lead restored, Anstey found it relatively easy to play round their opponents. Their progress was smoothed further by the consistent refusal of the referee to apply the same standards to both teams.

In the 38th minute, Haddow was fouled in a full-blooded challenge on the touchline.

Anstey were given the free kick, the Sphinx player was shown a yellow card and was unable to continue because of the injury he

Both teams had time remaining in the half to shoot over the crossbar, with more good work by Shorrock teeing up Brown to blast one high deep into stoppage time for the away side.

Sphinx made a decent start to the second half.

Four minutes in, Woodward's corner to the back post was headed back across goal by Edjenguele. Brown headed over with his shirt up around his head.



Despite better Sphinx play and that chance from a set piece, Anstey had a clear territorial advantage and Fallows had to save well with his feet in the tenth minute of the second half. Another shot went safely wide but the crucial few minutes came either side of the hour mark.

In the 60th minute, the Nomads made it 3-1. Another cross in was finished neatly, this time by Corey Armeni. His volley guided the ball into the corner to give the visitors a mountain to climb.

Two minutes later, Kyle Tomlin was played in behind and flicked the ball past Fallows with the outside of his right boot. At 4-1 the contest was beyond Sphinx but they didn't let their heads drop and they weren't found wanting for effort.

Brown had a couple of good looks at goal in the shadow of Anstev's quick-fire double. A nice touch by Demulder set the ball for the striker to drill it into the side netting, before a shot from just outside the box went over the

But, in truth, there was only really one team in it after Anstey's third goal, at least in terms of possession of the ball and field position. To add insult to injury, the home team made it two 5-1 defeats in a row for Sphinx by adding a fifth in stoppage time.

The visitors turned the ball over on the edge of their own box thanks to Nyle Blake's tenacity after losing possession himself, and he turned to fire over Fallows to conclude the scoring and end a difficult match for Sphinx.

It was an unpleasant afternoon on the outskirts of Leicester in just about every way but the overall

performance was by no means as disheartening as the previous defeat against Shepshed Dynamo in midweek.

Sphinx know better than most that it's not over until it's over and this relegation battle is no different. Time might be on their side but form is not, and they're not out of the woods yet with two games left to play.

Thomas and Woodward's team have work to do against Boldmere St Michaels and Hinckley Leicester Road in order to guarantee safety.

Owen returned to Mikes in October 2022 after 2 seasons at Rushall Olympic. He is a midfielder/ forward who was with Mikes from his academy days.

Pierre Phillips

Pierre has recently ascended to the senior squad after a fine spell in Mikes U21 team. He is a central defender and gives the squad extra stability in that area.

Red Simmons

Red is, at 17 years old, a long standing player at Mikes having come through the whole journey from the U8s. He has been playing regularly for the U21 team this season and has signed for the seniors for some experience. He is a full back who likes to get forward.

O'Shane Stewart

O'Shane came to Mikes from Redditch United in December 2023. He is a midfielder who has an eye for goal. He has previously played in the Home Counties for Kingstonian.

Harry Sweeney

Harry joined Mikes from Chelmsley Town in 2019 and has been a regular left back in the first team. He is gradually developing into a wing back and that's probably where his future lies.

Ben Usher-Shipway

Ben, who came through Mikes' youth set up and played for the seniors for three seasons before moving to Solihull Moors, Stourbridge and Leamington, has returned in September 2023 and will be deployed in a wide role.

George Washbourne

George has recently signed for Mikes after many seasons at Coleshill Town. He is a forward and will give some alternatives to Mikes' squad.

Danny Wood

Danny is still captain of Mikes' U21 team and has signed for the senior team to accustom himself to the higher level of football that he'll undoubtably be playing before very long. He is a midfielder.

BOLDMERE ST MICHAELS HISTORY

The club was established in 1883 as a vouth football team attached to the local church and soon progressed from playing friendlies against other church sides to playing competitive league football. As the boys outgrew youth football, they organised an open-age team, which played in various local leagues. In the 1947-48 season, they reached the semifinals of the FA Amateur Cup, losing 2-0 to Barnet in front of 27,000 at Highbury. In 1949, the club joined the Birmingham & District League.

During the 1950s the club's fortunes declined somewhat, as they resolved to remain staunchly amateur at a time when their rivals were becoming semiprofessional. In 1963 the club moved leagues to the Worcestershire Combination, later re-named the Midland Football Combination, where they were to remain for thirty years.

The most successful period was during the 1980/90s when they claimed the championship on three occasions and 1989/90 plus two league cup triumphs in 1989/90 (the double) and 1990/91 (under Alan Parsons).

This level of success saw the Mikes become founder members of the Midland Alliance in 1994, where they played until 2013-14, generally finishing in the top half of the table.

The club has won the Walsall Senior Cup on five occasions 1986/87 (under John Morris), 2005/06, 2006/07, 2007/08 (under Mick Bayley) and 2018/19 (under Stuart Grosvenor).

In the final season of the Midland Football Alliance, 2013-14 the club achieved its best position of runners-up (under Stuart Grosvenor). The Mikes were the only club to play in all twenty seasons in the Midland Alliance, reaching the league cup final twice in that time losing on both occasions to Market Drayton

Town and Stratford Town, In 2014-15 they became founding members of the Midland Football League Premier Division, scoring the first goal in the new competition in a 9-1 opening day win at

The most exciting chapter in the club's history took place in 2016 with a total stadium refurbishment and installing the latest artificial turf pitches, including two new floodlit courts for training and smallsided matches. Vice-Chairman Ralph Simmons was the driving force in this major change. The project was funded primarily by private investment to secure the club's future by investing in junior teams from age seven upwards.

The Junior section was awarded the FA Charter Standard and made its first move into Saturday Development football with two Midland Junior Premier League teams for 2017-18. The club has also been awarded Wildcats status as an FAaffiliated centre for girls' football.

(1985/86 under John Morris) and 1988/89 2017-18 also saw the launch of two new senior teams. Our brand new Academy in partnership with BMet (Sutton College) saw our BTEC students enter the National League Under 19 Youth Alliance, with the club also introducing an Under 21 team to bridge the gap to first-team football, playing in the MFL Under 21 Division.

> The lunior section now has eight teams competing in the Midland Junior Premier League and two Under 18 sides playing in the Midland Floodlit Youth League. In all the club has over fifty teams playing on Saturdays or Sundays.

The Women's team at the club won the National League Division 1 (Midlands) last season and will be playing in the National League Northern Premier Division in 2022/23. Unfortunately, they had a disappointing time and finished second last so the 2023/24 season will see the team competing back in the National League Division 1 (Midlands).

The floodlights installed circa 1990 have recently been upgraded due to the generosity of the Sutton Coldfield Town Council and a new dressing room block incorporating Hospitality and Boardroom facilities was brought into full use during the 2021/22 season. The clubhouse was refurbished in 2019 with further in hand now the new dressing room block in use. Work is now underway to demolish the old dressing rooms, introducing a junior recreation area, offices and a sensory

Managerial changes at the club are few current President Alan Parsons, a John Morris signing in 1987 held the hot seat for 16 years following Morris' departure to Halesowen Town; Rob Mallaband, the current Chairman has had two spells split by Mick Bayley's three-year reign whilst Stuart Grosvenor's tenancy lasted six seasons. In early September 2019, the club Board decided a change of football manager was required and following great interest were delighted to appoint former player Neil Kitching along with his assistants Nick Amos and Ian Cooper to the hot seat. Taking over with the club in the lower reaches of the table the management improved matters as the season progressed and were in a healthy position before COVID struck the country. Their efforts were finally rewarded in the 2021/22 season when a second-placed finish saw them win a promotion/ relegation playoff game at Chalfont St

In the debut season in The Northern Premier League Midlands Division the final placing of ninth was a disappointment as the club had occupied fourth or fifth place throughout the season and looked to have secured a play -off place. Injuries plus defeats in the last three matches proved the undoing. The highlight of the campaign was the double over promotion favourites (they went through via the pay-offs) Halesowen Town. Will the 2023/24 season better last season's efforts?
